**Health First.**  
Now that winter has passed and warm weather approaches, it is most essential in the interests of health that the garbage and rubbish which has accumulated during the cold months should be carefully gathered up and promptly disposed of. She that all rubbish is removed from your cellar, back yard and surroundings.  
Do not forget to ventilate damp cellars. Ceap all windows and keep them open to fresh air and sunlight. See that all leaky roofs and bad plumbing are repaired, and do not tolerate dirty, broken walls and ceilings.  
Do not forget what plenty of soap, hot water and sunshine will do to assist you in "cleaning up."  
Do not forget the attic or any place where flies and germs breed.  
Dry sweeping and dry dusting are dangerous practices. Use the damp broom, the oil-mop, or oil or dampened cloths.  
Burn old waste paper and other household rubbish at least once each week.  
Drain moisture from garbage bins before placing it in the garbage can. Provide yourself with a proper garbage can—a covered can, made of galvanized iron, not less than fifteen inches in diameter and two feet high. Put this can in a readily accessible place where the garbage collector can reach it.  
Do not throw waste paper of any description on any street or park, nor in your own yard.  
Do not expectorate on any sidewalk or street car or on any floor. It is a detestable habit, breeds disease and in most places is against the law.  
Do not let milk bottles stand unwashed after use. Wash them at once and do not fail to rinse the bottles in cold water before sealing.  
Do not tolerate stagnant pools and all smelly refuse piles. They breed mosquitoes and flies, and consequently disease. Keep loose manure in covered boxes and have it carried away at least once a week.  
Right fifth, flies fever and tenebris.

Among the great sieges of history that of Pzemysl will stand high since the siege of Gibraltar in 1779. It ending in the relief of the strong-hold after three years, seven months and twelve days, the important sieges have been:  
1856—Sebastopol, 322 days. Capitulated.  
1857—Delhi, 131 days. Relieved.  
1857—Lucknow, 143 days. Relieved.  
1863—Vichsburg, 186 days. Relieved.  
1865—Richmond, 237 days. Evacuated.  
1870—Metz, 134 days. Capitulated.  
1870—Paris, 135 days. Fell.  
1877—Plevna, 144 days. Fell.  
1899—Port Arthur, 241 days. Fell.  
1912—Adrianople, 155 days. Fell.  
1914—Pzemysl, 185 days. Fell.

**Hope of Peace.**  
Hope of an early termination of the war is again raised by General French's public statement. The war, he thinks, will not be a long one. He calls for more ammunition of which he has a supply drawn from every available source, and he encourages the hope of an early and decisive victory. As he is to be presumed to speak of the campaign in France and Belgium it is reasonably to be inferred that an effort is to be made to drive the Germans from their entrenchments by an overwhelming artillery fire. Apparently, it is known or believed that the German ammunition is failing. The terrible affair at Neuve Chapelle in which more than 300 English officers were killed and wounded, and whole regiments were worn down on both sides may have been a trial of the proposed plan of advance. The conflict which is certain to involve enormous losses will be awaited with painful anxiety.

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**General Alderson Addresses Canadians Before Taking Trenches.**  
'All ranks of the Canadian division: We are about to occupy and maintain a line of trenches. I have some things to say to you at this moment which it is well that you should consider. Do not expose your heads; do not look around corners unless for a purpose which is necessary the moment that you do it. It will not often be necessary. You are provided with means of observing the enemy without exposing your heads. To lose your life without military necessity is to deprive the state of good soldiers.  
'Young and brave men enjoy taking risks. But a soldier who takes unnecessary risks through levity is not playing the game, and the man who does so is also stupid, for whatever be the average practice of the German army, the individual shots which they employ as snipers, shoot straight, and screened from observation behind the lines, they are always watching. If you put your head over the parapet without orders, they will hit that head.  
You will not do it. It wastes ammunition, and it hurts no one. And the enemy says: 'These are new and nervous troops.' No German is going to say that of the Canadian troops. You will be shelled in the trenches. When you are shelled sit low and sit tight. This is easy advice for there is nothing else to do. If you get out you will only get it worse. And, if the Germans go in, we shall counter attack and put them out, and that will cost us hundreds of men, instead of the few whom the shells will injure.  
'The Germans do not like the bayonet, nor do they support bayonet attacks. If they get up to you or if you get up to them, go right in with the bayonet. You have the physique to drive it home. That you will do I am sure, and I do not envy the Germans if you get among them with the bayonet.  
There is one thing more. My old regiment, the Royal West Kent, has been here since the beginning of the war, and it has never lost a trench. The army says, 'the West Kent never budge.' I am proud of that great record of my old regiment, and I think it is a good omen. I now belong to you and you belong to me; and before very long the army will say 'the Canadians never budge.'  
'Lads, it can be left here, and there I leave it. The Germans will never turn you out.'
