At a special meeting of the School Board on Monday evening one of the most important items of the town estimates was considered and passed upon. The Board asked for the sum of \$12,425, for school purposes during the current year, in addition to the revenue coming from grants, tuitions, etc., estimated at \$1540. The total expense of our schools will include besides this the sum of \$970.52, the amount required for sinking funds, making a total of \$4935.52. This will be practically a rate of \$1.50 on the hundred dollars for our schools, which should ensure good service in that department during the year 1922.

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS

Mr. D. Mosher, agent for the S. P. C. A., accompanied by Policeman Crowell, made a visit to different sections on the South Mountain last week, in compliance with requests made that investigation of cases of cruelty should be instituted. They visited several farms and in some cases found conditions very bad. In one case two neglected and apparently ill-treated horses were shot by the officers and in another two horses were taken and brought to Wolfville where they were placed in Jackson's Stables for ten days at the expense of the owner. The officers report that in one case the family and horses were all living together in a barn and that the condition of the animals in several cases was most deplorable. It is understood that Mr. Mosher will return to this vicinity later and further action will be taken in the interest of ill-treated dumb animals.

CLINIC ITEMS

Child Welfare Clinic, Friday, March 31. Is your child handicapped? Does your child's nose run or is it sore? Are the eyes red? Are there fever sores or eczema around nose and mouth? Does the child seem dull? Does it stand and look at you with open mouth? Does it put its hands to its head as though it had earache? Does it take cold easily? Does the child sleep with its mouth open? Does it snore?

If the answer to any of these is yes, ask the doctor if the child has adenoids or tonsils. (From "Giving the Child a Better Chance", Metropolitan Life.)
