## CONFIRMATION SERVICE

Six candidates were confirmed by Bishop Richardson in Burt's hall on Sunday morning, three of the number being adults. The service was most impressive. The sermon was a powerful discourse on the biblical and historical authority for confirmation. His Lordship was most eloquent in defining the Church's use of the word "Catholic." In earnest tones he declared that "I would stretch forth my hands to the uttermost ends of the earth and gather in every baptized person—Methodist, Baptist, Roman, Anglican—as comprising the Catholic church, 'the whole of Christ's church militant here on earth,' for which in our prayers we ask God's blessing."

At this service more than 200 were seated, many stood throughout and a number were unable to gain admittance to the hall. Immediately after the service His Lordship was conveyed to Glassville by James Montgomery with his auto. At that place a number were confirmed, and also a class at Beaufort. The party returned to Hartland late in the evening, those comprising the number besides Bishop Richardson and Mr. Montgomery being Mrs. Montgomery, Rev. N. Franchette and Miss Lou Smith.
