### A Rotten System.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Mr. Editor.—Now that we have learned that Job's would not take the contract for the running of the motor ferry system on the Placentia Gut, who will be the unfortunates that will take the contract. I hope not Fitzgerald, the man from Fogo.

I must now point out to you, Mr. Editor, the positions and the dangers which exist in the Gut at the present time.

For the past two months it has been the one continuous gale of north east and easterly winds, and the people visiting the town of Placentia have to cross at the risk of their lives in two old black punts put there by Jackman and Sullivan about eleven years ago. At the very least an average of seven hundred people cross daily in these two boats which are at the present time unfit for the safety of the travelling public. Take the people from Dunville, from Fox Harbor, Little Placentia, or (Argentea) and I might say all parts of Placentia Bay got to cross to the town side for priest and doctors, or I might say any important any business, and I say positively at the risk of their lives. Only two or three days ago a plank came off one of the black punts while crossing in the wind and tide, and great credit is due Mr. Mansfield for the able manner in which he got the old punt safely to the beach.

Now, here is what the people of Fox Harbor, Dunville, Argentea and Placentia will have to witness if not remedied in a short time, they will witness the drowning of their mother, or wife, sister or brother, or perhaps the father of a large family.

What a nice thing, Mr. Editor, to have an accident in the Gut and we with a "cod" of a motor boat costing the people of Trepassy, St. Mary's, Selmonia and St. John's \$3,000, taken out of their Road Grants and put in the so-called motor boat now lying up at Murphy's premises.

I suppose, Mr. Editor, there is no other place in the island of Newfoundland that such a traffic is carried on, and such an absurd ferry system exists as that which is existing at the present time on Placentia Gut.

We have listened to Mr. Howley and Mr. Devereaux stating they would improve the ferry system, they would improve the roads and the bridges; but what about it, who has the money. Devereaux has it with his fat job going around the district getting \$150 (one hundred and fifty dollars per month) keeping the honest fisherman from catching a salmon to eat or sell; but the fishermen will resent this when the "cods" come around in 1912. They will say Devereaux where he should be placed, down and out, and they shall re-elect Messrs. Jackman, Sullivan and Davis and set our roads and bridges and ferry system once more under the reliable system, worked by three reliable representatives.

## Cable News.

### Parliament Dissolved.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Nov. 28.

The second Parliament in the reign of the late King Edward VII., which met on Feb. 15th last, was dissolved to-day in pursuance of the programme of the Liberal Government to go before the country on the question of the prerogative of the House of Lords. The King's Speech was notable for its brevity, the only reference to the constitutional crisis being a colourless expression of regret that the conference between the leaders of the opposing controlling parties had failed to agree on the reformation of the Upper Chamber. The longest and most interesting paragraph, which immediately followed an allusion to the death of His Majesty's father, dealt with the recent arbitration of the Newfoundland Fisheries Dispute with the United States. It confidently hope that the questions connected with the North Atlantic fisheries between Canada and Newfoundland on one hand, and the United States on the other, which had been the subject of controversy for nearly a century, have been at last finally settled by the award of the Hague Tribunal. It is a cause of special satisfaction that it has been found possible to solve by arbitration problems of such intricate and difficult a nature, and that the award has been received by both sides in a spirit which must tend to increase good will.

### Special to Evening Telegram.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 28.

Joseph Wendling was called before Judge Gregory in court to-day to answer to the charge of murdering 5 year old Alma Kellner in St. John's Catholic Church, Dec. 10th, 1909. Wendling, who was janitor at the church, where the Kellner child had gone to Mass, is charged with having assaulted and murdered the girl and then hidden her body in the church basement. Portions of the child's body were found months later and after Wendling had mysteriously disappeared. Wendling was arrested in San Francisco, after a chase of 11,000 miles. Two of the chief witnesses for the prosecution are Detective Burke, of San Francisco, who arrested Wendling, and Mrs. Ira Munce, of Hume, Missouri, from whom information was received which led to Wendling's arrest.

### Special Evening Telegram.

ELPASO, Texas, Nov. 28.

According to the staff correspondents of the El Paso Herald, who have returned here, there are prospects of further trouble in the disaffected districts of Chihuahua and Durango. They declared that 90 per cent. of the natives in that part of Mexico are against the Diaz Government, and that the open supporters of the revolutionists are passive. They also state that the revolutionary army is not made up of bad men and bandits, as has been reported, but consists of unemployed mechanics, farmers, mechanics and others. The insurgents appear to have plenty of arms and ammunition and seem to have plenty of money behind them. Both the Diaz Government and the revolutionists have not been conquered but only driven into the mountains. Desultory fighting is expected to continue there for some time. Several small fights within the last few days.

### Special to Evening Telegram.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 28.

A girl just past her 17th year, Hattie LeBlanc, will be tried in the Middlesex County Superior Court here this week for the murder at Waltham, Nov. 20th, 1909, of her employer, Charles F. Glover. The little French Canadian girl is the youngest of her sex tried for first degree murder in the annals of New England courts. Her aged father has come from his home in West Africa, to aid his daughter, Clarence F. Glover was shot in the back in the Waltham laundry, and before his death accused Hattie LeBlanc who was in the laundry with him at the time. The girl who was employed in his family was found three weeks later under Glover's home.

### Special Evening Telegram.

ELPASO, Texas, Nov. 28.

A telegram has been received by Jeff Portillo at Lubrez from Secretary of State, Mr. Taft, stating that a fight had taken place between the insurgents and federal forces near that city. According to the dispatch 30 insurgents were killed and many wounded. The Federals have taken several hundred prisoners and seized a large quantity of ammunition. The casualties to the Federals up to the time of sending the telegram were one captain and three privates wounded. The insurgents were completely routed and fled back to their stronghold in the hills with the Government forces in pursuit.

### Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Nov. 28.

The Madrid correspondent of the Times says King Alfonso renounces his position as arbitrator in the frontier dispute between Peru and Ecuador on learning that Ecuador did not desire to arbitrate. The Diario Universal of Madrid, of Oct. 21st, announced that King Alfonso would decline to assume plenary powers in the settlement of the dispute, considering that a binding decision would be likely to precipitate a collision between Ecuador and Peru, and that he would propose that the parties concerned invest him with the facilities only of a friendly arbitrator.

### Special Evening Telegram.

ROME, Nov. 28.

During an audience which he gave to-day to the Most Rev. Francis Bourne, Archbishop of Westminster, His Holiness showed much interest in the approaching British elections. He inquired especially regarding the probable result both in connection with the House of Lords controversy and the question of Home Rule for Ireland, and the likely effect of the latter upon Catholicism in the United Kingdom.
