
ROME, Nov. 15. The official statement issued today at the headquarters of the Italian General Staff, reports progress at several points, but there were no important developments.

LONDON, Nov. 15. A Petrograd despatch to Reuter's Felegram Company says that Japan has rendered opportune aid in the Baltic duel between Generals Russky and Field Marshal Von Hindenburg in the matter of shells; and now that artillery conditions have been equalized, the Russians are confident of the result. 
