

LONDON, To-day. Nine divisions of reserves from the army of Crown Prince Rupprecht, of Bavaria, and a division from the east ern end of the line, have been rushed to the aid of the Crown Prince William, between Soissons and Rheims but, says Reuter's correspondent with American troops in France, the Germans may well hesitate to push more troops into the already crowded salient, seeing the difficulty they have of feeding those already there. German resistance on the southern sectors of the salient has been reduced to a mere shell, it is added, and the enemy doubtlessly is concentrating his efforts on keeping open the northern outlets of the salient.
