Dear Sir.—The Committee in charge of the Permanent Marine Disaster Fund thank Dr. Howlett and all who gave their services gratuitously, for the sum of \$17.24 net proceeds of the several performances of the Admiral's Daughter in January last, the receipt of which is thus acknowledged. Epidemic of Violence
Among Eskimos.

"An epidemic of violence" has broken out among the usually kindly and docile Eskimos, according to the annual report of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for the year ending September 30, 1922, issued at the headquarters in Regina.

"It is unfortunately necessary to report a large number of crimes of violence among the Eskimos," say the report. "At present we have under arrest on charges of murder, or related crimes, no fewer than nine of the people, three at Pond's Inlet (on the northern coast of Baffin Land), five at Herschel Island, and one at Trese River. The number of deaths involved is 12, and of these three are white men. In addition several other murder cases are under investigation, but arrests have not yet been made. In the summer of 1922, two courts will proceed to Pond's Inlet and the other to Herschel Island."
