

In Passing.

The political situation is commanding the first place of interest with the public at the present time, and the varied and the rumors are to a possible outcome of the differences which exist in the circles.

As an authentic source it is known that the Prime Minister is expected to recognize his government and the assistance of Sir William and the Hon. W. R. Warren, Minister of Justice.

William's personal following in the present government is considered to be more than that of the opposition and it is stated that the Minister has succeeded in his efforts to get the support of three of the F.P.U. members to stand by the event of a show down.

It is also reported that the Attorney Generalship will be offered to Mr. Macdonald, a member of the Bay de Verde and that there will be very big changes in the departmental staff according to Sir Richard. It is said that one or possibly two changes may be affected by the Minister taken by Sir William or the Minister of Justice.

Mr. Macdonald is closely associated with the Premier in the government and speaks his mind in repeated instances. Sir Richard is fully prepared to do so with an assured manner despite any action taken by any three or four members now in the government who he claims were not in his policy and manifesto.

Sir Richard is firm in his determination to stand by his friend Hon. Macdonald, Minister of Agriculture. He has despite the agitation of the force an investigation into the irregularities in connection with the publication of some accounts of the Agriculture Department and pit props, which at least, contained a scandalous implication of the people's money, has been aroused and a very source we learn it is a general opinion that an immediate investigation is urgent and that the pressure should be brought upon the Minister of Justice to the same conducted without delay.

With the reports current it is that Hon. Mr. Warren has had his intention to have an office conducted, and that he has already called the Minister of Finance and Mines the necessary immediate return for the purchase of the Minister will naturally be a principal witness to be examined at the course of the proceedings. 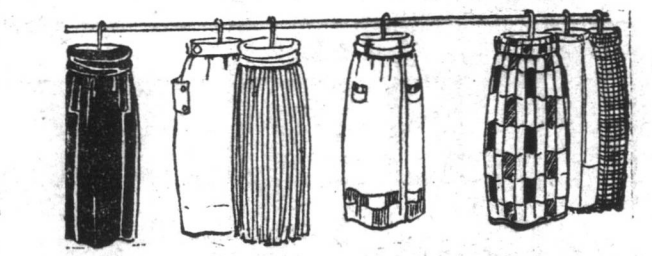

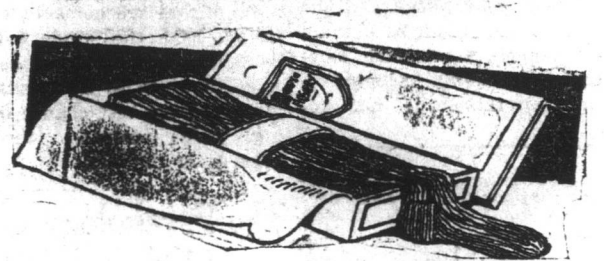

Night Watchman Makes Gruesome Find.

BODY OF PEDDLE BOY FOUND FLOATING IN HARBOUR.

The mystery surrounding the disappearance of the little boy Peddle who wandered away from his home, Rosier's Lane, on June 10th last, was cleared up last night, when the body was found floating near the breastwork at Balne Johnstone's Southside Premises, by the watchman who was going his rounds at 8.40. As soon as the gruesome find was made he immediately communicated with the Police Department, which detailed Constables Walsh and Wade to proceed to the scene, from whence the body was conveyed to the morgue. Dr. Anderson later viewed the remains and pronounced death due to drowning. The body was in a very badly decomposed condition, having been in the water for over five weeks. Archibald Peddle, who was only 4 years of age, was last seen on the Long Bridge at 10 o'clock on the night of June 10th, by a woman who was crossing at the time, and it is believed he fell in the water about that hour, the swift undertow from the river carrying the little body down the stream into the harbour. Ever since the lad was first reported as missing his father and mother have been distracted over his whereabouts, and now that the mystery surrounding the disappearance of the child has come to an end, general sympathy is felt for them.
