#### MAJORITY OF 8 PEOPLE FAVOR LEAGUE.

OTTAWA, Nov. 25. The majority of the people in the United States who do their own thinking believe we should have gone into the League of Nations, said Franklin H. Martin, Director General of the American College of Surgeons, in an address here Saturday before the Canadian Club. Prominent statements in the United States among whom he mentioned Hoff, Hughes, Root and Hoover, were to-day ready and anxious to stand behind some programme of adherence to the League if they could only do so without too palatable a right about face. The dominating political party, however, backed by a powerful and wealthy press, had conducted a campaign of depreciation and ridicule of the League and it was now necessary for some outstanding American statesman to come out in downright support of the League. Dr. Martin asserted there was an influential group in the party which was growing restless and outspoken with regard to the League and gave it as his opinion that a new pronouncement would be made in the near future.

#### Schooner Abandoned off Outer Cove.

CREW ESCAPE WITH THEIR LIVES.

Schr. Rosaleen, 25 tons, with a crew of four on board, had a narrow escape for their lives yesterday afternoon, after abandoning their vessel a few miles off Outer Cove. The Rosaleen left here 9 o'clock yesterday morning, with a full load of provisions on board, bound for Hr. Grace. After leaving the Narrows, on her way North, a heavy sea was encountered, which badly buffeted the vessel about, with little or no progress being made. It was not until darkness had set in that serious trouble arose. The little vessel was running under a fore-sail a short distance off Outer Cove, when a heavy sea came in and broke off the rudder post, below the deck. The vessel was now left in a helpless condition, and began to drift rapidly towards the rocks which loomed up only a short distance away. The crew were powerless, and there was nothing left to do but leave it to its fate and save their lives. Capt. Bartlett and his crew launched a boat, and after rowing about in the heavy sea for upwards of two hours, they managed to land safely at Middle Cove. Capt. Bartlett and his crew arrived in the city last night. They lost all their belongings beside all their wages, which they had left in their bunk on board the vessel. They had come here intending to purchase their winter's provisions, but, securing a freight, they postponed their own business until the next trip. The vessel carried no insurance, and the loss to Capt. Bartlett is a heavy one.

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## The 'Times' Considers Stresemann's Downfall Most Ominous.

Ottawa Learns that the Sale of Labrador is being Negotiated --- "Rumy Ball" Mecco, the Rum Row King is Captured --- Prominent Americans Advocate Participation in the League of Nations.

#### STRESEMANN'S DOWNFALL SERIOUSLY REGARDED.

LONDON, Nov. 24. The downfall of the Stresemann government is viewed here as an event of utmost significance, possibly leading to developments destined to have a deep and lasting effect upon Europe. How serious the crisis is judged may be judged from the fact that some of the morning papers out of British election news from the last page to display their Berlin despatches on the Reichstag's rejection of the Chancellor, and the situation in Germany generally. The "Times" is upon it with great gravity, and the plain fact is that Germany is breaking up. This fact must be held now as the most important in contemporary Europe, with the great traditions of Russia in the background.

#### LITTLE KNOWN IN OTTAWA.

OTTAWA, Nov. 24. Negotiations regarding the purchase of Labrador by Canada, which are reported to have taken place between Premier Mackenzie King and Premier Mecco of Newfoundland, while they were attending the Imperial Conference in London. No further information is available, but it is known that the Labrador Boundary has been the subject of negotiations between Canada and Newfoundland for some time. Probably the Conference will be resumed when the Premiers arrive here.
