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THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT.

The London Canadian News, of the 15th Aug., says:—"The session is not to be a long one, the business to be done being confined to the passing of the necessary legislation for an indemnity for whatever money may have been expended since the 30th June last, (that being the date up to which all the estimates had been passed by the late Parliament) for assimilating the tariffs of the several provinces into one general tariff for the whole Dominion; and for the passing of the necessary measures with reference to the Intercolonial Railway, the surveys of which are to be immediately placed in the hands of Mr. A. Luders Light and Mr. Sanford Fleming. As soon as these legislative enactments are passed, it will be proposed that the Parliament do then adjourn until January next, when a special session will be held."
