London and the Provincial Exhibition.

The Toronto people are in expectation of having the Provincial Exhibition at that metropolis this year. They say that the buildings in London have for a long time been occupied by the troops, and the cost of making the necessary alterations is found to be double what was expected when the City Council gave the requisite guarantee to the Agricultural Association.

Per contra the Free Press says the Torontonians have made a mistake in supposing that any such sum as \$8,000 will be required to make the necessary repairs, that \$2,500 is all that is needed, and that amount has been already voted; and charges Toronto "rings" with endeavor to centralize the Exhibition. In conclusion it says, "The law has decided that the Exhibition is to be held in London, and the dodge which appears to be in contemplation to rush up expenses to the highest point, with the view of breaking through the law, upon the plea of a lapse of agreement, will only end in setting afoot influences which will bring about the result Professor Buckland anticipated, namely, that such a course would be a death-blow to the Institution."

Board of Public Instruction.

The half yearly examination of teachers and candidates for teachers by the Board of Public Instruction for the South Riding of Wellington was concluded on the Thursday, when the following were granted certificates:—

At a meeting of the Board, at the close of the examination, the report of the committee appointed to consider the new School Bill was read.

A complaint and memorial from a number of ratepayers in Section No. 3, Guelph Township, was read, in which they complained of the insufficiency of the teacher in that section, Mr. Alex. Kennedy, also in his administration of punishment, and of other irregularities and violations of duty.

A resolution was passed instructing the Superintendent, Mr. Kilgour, to investigate the case referred to in the memorial from these ratepayers, and to act in the meantime as he may think best, and report to the Board at his earliest convenience.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES.

The Irish Church Bill Again.

Governor of Catalonia Dismissed.

M. Rouher's Resignation.

LONDON, July 9th, midnight.—In the House of Lords the Irish Church Bill came up for report from the committee.

On motion of Lord Cairnes the date 1st of May, 1871, was substituted for the 1st of January, 1872, throughout the Bill.

Lord Redesdale moved an amendment that the representatives of the Irish Church and the Catholic Synod in cases of vacant Bishops nominate three persons for the Crown to select from, and that the Crown be empowered to summon one archbishop and two bishops from each church to sit in Parliament.

The Earl of Granard protested on the part of the Catholics against the amendment which he declared was utterly inadmissible, and it was withdrawn.

The Marquis of Clanricarde moved that clause 28, giving power to convey additional land to the Church body be restored to its original form. He said the clause as now amended revived Protestant ascendancy in its most hateful form, giving glebe lands to the Church body, but refusing them to Catholics and Presbyterians. It was certain that the Government and the House of Commons would never sanction the amended clause.

The Marquis of Salisbury replied that in moving the amendment he contemplated similar grants to the Catholics and Presbyterians, according to Mr. Bright's original proposal which Mr. Gladstone had endorsed, but he thought that the election of their own Glebes by the Irish Church was not unfair.

The Marquis of Clanricarde's motion to restore clause 28, was lost by a vote of 40 to 81. An amendment embracing the proposal of Earl Granville to pay half a million sterling in money, instead of handing over private endowments created before 1660, was agreed to. The report was then received.

After further discussion the Earl of Denbigh announced that the Catholics had decided not to accept glebe lands or residences.

The Earl of Clancarty gave notice that when the Bill came up for the third reading he would move a postponement of the reading for three months.

PARIS, July 9.—The evening journals announce the resignation of the Ministers. It is believed that M. Rouher has been commissioned to form a new cabinet which will include four members of the Thiers party. A manifesto from the Emperor is looked for.

MADRID, July 9.—The press and the people, generally, condemn the ministry. The Governor of Catalonia has been dismissed for not preventing a republican demonstration in Barcelona. Disorders are anticipated there and troops are kept in readiness to prevent any disturbance.

NEW YORK, 10th.—The Herald's cable special says the Ministerial crisis in France continues. The constitutional opposition in the Corps Legislatif declare their ultimate object to be the retirement of Minister of State, M. Rouher.

The Emperor desires his retirement. He is reluctant to dismiss him on account of his ability and devotion to the Government. M. Rouher's fall coincides with the wish of the Emperor under his resignation, is

verely criticised. Yesterday the proprietor of one of the leading journals said to him. "M. Rouher your time has come, clear out." "I know it," answered M. Rouher, "but my wife won't resign." This is literally true. Madame Rouher objects to giving up the honors which she receives at the palace as wife of the Chief of the Emperor's Ministry. The Emperor will wait a little while before insisting upon an unavoidable resignation, until their little domestic trouble can be arranged. The majority of the Assembly are opposed to the propositions demanded by the members of the Left Centre, which are as follows: 1st, A responsible Ministry; 2d autonomy of the Legislative Assembly. The Emperor is therefore obliged to temporize with the majority, whom he does not wish to openly defy. Hence he present deadlock which must end in the course of the present week.
