ALBERTA ELEVEN IN THE LEAD FOR WESTERN CANADA CRICKET HONORS; DEFEATED CALGARY TEAM YESTERDAY

Second Day of Tournament Shows Strength of Alberta Team; Saskatchewan Eleven, Which Won Tournament Last Year, has Made Poor Showing Thus Far; Poor Batting of Calgary Men was One of the Surprises

The close of yesterday's play in the Western Canada tournament still saw Alberta as the head; they following up their fine victory over Saskatchewan on Monday with a victory over Calgary and they look likely winners if they can keep up their present form right through the week.

The surprising part of the day's play continued to be the poor batting of the Calgary side, all being out for 25. The only man who played with any confidence was P. P. Barnett, who followed up his splendid innings of yesterday with another 44. Spick, who came in sixth, straggled a little, making 19, but the others were dismissed very cheaply, the tail especially waging very weakly.

Hill was very deadly, getting five wickets for 44, and Sharp's bowling also mastered the batters, his three wickets costing him only 10 runs. With his job, Dickens again captured two wickets for three runs.

Alberta scored steadily. There were no big scores in the Alberta side, 27 by G. P. Herkshaw being the highest. All through, however, they were more consistent than the other sides. Morse, Dickens and Anderson also reaching double figures, the only man failing to break his duck being Read. Richardson was the most effective bowler for Calgary, he getting four wickets for 21. Nettleton took three for 27, and Spick 3 for 64.

Saskatchewan Team Weak. Saskatchewan have not by any means so good a team as represented them last season at Indian Head. Their batting strength is but moderate, and their bowling does not seem to present many difficulties to the opposing batsmen. Against Manitoba they only knocked off to the moderate total of 152. The first six batsmen did fairly well, but then there was a sudden collapse, the last four wickets falling in five balls without a single run being added. MacFarlane and Chatterworth brought this about, each being credited with two. MacFarlane had five balls to his credit, taking six wickets for 45 runs. Amey took two for 31, and Chatterworth two for 42.

R. Edwards' Fine Batting. The outstanding feature of the Saskatchewan innings was the batting of R. Edwards. His gritty stroke made up of three sixes, five fours, and one top. Wilson, who totalled 41, also played some bright cricket, two sixes and six fours being his best scoring strokes, whilst Bracewell, in 25, had four fours.

Manitoba Innings. Manitoba commenced shakily, their first wicket falling in the second 25, and the third at 40. Chatterworth and McIntosh then became associated and added 52 before the former was caught by Gibson of Goldie. He had played cautiously, but then he suddenly made up his mind. He hit two sixes and six fours.

Edmonton, Aug. 7.—The Eskimos walked off early this morning for different spots on the lot yesterday, and won the game by the score of 9 to 1. Heinie Heinrichs was given erroneous support by his team mates, and although he allowed seven hits, they were well scattered. The box score:
