LacrosseRANK OUTSIDER WINS DERBY
AMID GREAT EXCITEMENT

Aboyeur Given First Place by Judges When Craganour, the Favorite, was Disqualified — Suffragette Attempts Suicide

PEOP. ENG. June 4.—Today's race for the Derby, the "Blue Ribbon" of the British turf, was the most sensational on record. It was made memorable by a daring suffragette's outrage, in which a woman was terribly injured while trying to stop King George's Cup winner, Craganour, from starting.

Aboyeur, when he was running, was disqualified for bumping Craganour, the favorite, after he had passed the winning post first. He had passed the winning post first, and by the award of the race with its prize of \$22,500 to a rank outsider, Aboyeur, a one hundred to one chance.

Interest in the classic event was at its most tense point, just as the fifth horse was turning, Craganour, when he was thrown under the horse's head and terribly kicked. She was taken at once, unconscious, to a hospital, suffering from severe injuries to her head. Suffragette papers are said to have been found in her possession, and a suffragette flag found around her body. Her name was given as Emily Widding Davison, and her age as 40.

Excitement at Finish. Meanwhile the race had come to a conclusion with an exciting struggle and a close finish. It was said that Craganour, the favorite, had won. Almost immediately, however, the enormity of the disaster which had befallen the favorite was realized. Aboyeur, who had been running second, was declared the winner.
