The chances of the London lot look brighter than they did, for Curtin is said to be getting them fit in time. BUTCHERED FOR HER MONEY.

An Old Colored Woman Found Murdered in Camden, N. J.

CAMDEN, N. J., May 11.—Lydia Ann Wyatt, colored, 78, was found dead in her hume on Sixth street, her brains having been beaten out. The man with whom she had lived, James R. Moulton, also colored, is under arrest for the cu'mo.

Robbery was the incentive for the murder, as the woman was reputed to be well off. A week ago she had sold some property for \$800. Moulton never had any money, but when arrested \$250 was found on him. He denies having killed was in disorder when the police took possession of it. The stove was upset, table and chairs broken and the walls smeared with blood. Every drawer in the bureau had been ransacked, and wearing apparel which they contained strewn about.

The authorities say they have a letter written by Moulton to a Philadelphia physician, offering to sell him Mrs. Wyatt's body, "dead or alive."
