Toronto, July 16—11 p.m.—The pressure is comparatively low tonight over the lake region and Eastern Canada and about normal elsewhere. A few scattered thunder storms have occurred in Canada, but on the whole the weather has been fine. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 46°—72°; Qu'Appelle, 46°—72°; Winnipeg, 58°—72°; Toronto, 64°—84°; Montreal, 70°—82°; Quebec, 68°—80°; Halifax, 52°—64°.

215 B. C.—Carnegie, founder of the New Academy, Greek school of philosophy, born at Olynthus, Thessaly, died 129 B. C.

—Dr. Leslie, of Chicago, formerly of London, is to lecture in the Centennial Methodist Sunday school to-night on his work as a missionary in the Dark Continent.

—Rev. G. W. Henderson went to Toronto yesterday to revise the printer's proofs of the minutes of the last session of the London Conference. [Windsor Record.]

—Mr. J. B. McLeod, late engineer on the G. T. R., has been appointed head organizer for the Woodman of the World. John is a hustler and will no doubt do some good work.

—Wor. Bro. A. Carrothers has left for Ottawa to attend the annual convocation of the Grand Lodge of the Grand Chapter, A. F. and A. M., G. R. C.

—Mrs. James Gardiner, daughter of Mr. J. N. Kenny, has had a successful surgical operation performed at the London hospital. Mr. and Mrs. Gardiner now reside at Joliet, Ill. [Ridgeway Standard.]

—Dr. Leonard wishes it stated that he will not leave here until Thursday evening. The business of the office and the interests of the citizens require his presence here a few days longer than was at first thought.

—On Wednesday Mayor Fleming, of Windsor, Mrs. Fleming, Mrs. W. M. Gartshore, of London, and Mrs. Scotton, of Detroit, drove down from Windsor, and spent the day at the Lake View. [Amherstburg Echo.]

—The kind Orangemen of Watford and neighborhood have again remembered the Protestant Orphan's Home by a generous collection of \$14 25, for which the trustees are exceedingly grateful, and received per Mr. Thomas Woods, treasurer, county London.

—Edward Dyer and John Brennan were tried before Judge Elliot on Saturday on the charge of stealing and receiving a coat belonging to Mrs. Perris, of Oxford street. They were found guilty, and Dyer got eight months and Brennan five. The prisoners testified on their own behalf.

—R. Mathison, M.A., of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, Belleville, represents Ontario at the world's congress of instructors of the deaf at the Chicago Exposition. The meetings of the congress begin to-day and will continue two weeks. A large number of delegates from Europe and America are expected.

—The patrol wagon was called out yesterday afternoon by a resident of Maple avenue. He had seen a man trying to set fire to a neighboring house. When the wagon arrived on the scene, however, he was profuse in his apologies. The supposed incendiary was only a resident, with his head concealed in gauze, trying to smoke out a wasp's nest.

City Water Cut Off.

About three o'clock yesterday afternoon a joint in the watermain in the river, at York street broke, and as a result the city was deprived of water for more than three hours, greatly to the inconvenience of cooks and the discomfort of thirsty people.

Supper was rather late in many households. The waterworks employees lost no time in repairing the break. The gates at the dam were let down in order to lower the river.

The steamer, in consequence, could not make its usual trip, and a large crowd was disappointed. It was fortunate that a fire did not occur during the interval, as there was no water service.

The Komoka Accident.

Though the C. P. R. track was cleared at the scene of the Komoka accident within a short time after its occurrence, the removal of the derailed cars was no easy matter, and the railway men worked long hours to effect it.

The Toronto Mail says that Mr. Anur Mow, one of the passengers injured in the accident, has been a guest at the Walker House, Toronto, where he was to stay till to-day, in order to recover from the result of the accident. He has five stitches in his head and his right shoulder and leg are badly bruised. He considers himself fortunate in getting off so easily, and will proceed to his home in New Brunswick when able.

Death of Mr. James Southcott.

The death of Mr. James Southcott on Saturday last removes another of the pioneers of the city. In the first London directory published he and his brother Charles are described as keeping a tailoring establishment on the corner of Richmond and York streets, where the Grigg House now stands. In 1864 Mr. Southcott quit tailoring and joined Mr. Ayres, then warden of the county, in a general grocery and produce trade on Talbot street. On the death of his partner he continued the business until his health compelled him to retire a few months since. Mr. Southcott was one of the founders of the Bible Christian Church in this city, and remained a devoted adherent until the union of all the Methodist branches took place. He had since been a member of the Wellington Street congregation. He was above all things a sincere God-fearing man, and carried his Christianity into every detail of his life. His wife, a sister of the late Robert James, and two sons, S. J. and W. C., survive him. Deceased was born in Macclesfield, Cheshire, England, and came to Canada on his wedding trip, settling in London.

THE LATE TRUSTEE COOK.

A Resolution of Condolence by His Colleagues on the Board of Education—Words of Sympathy.

A special meeting of the Board of Education was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, Saturday, at 5 p.m., with reference to the death of Trustee James B. Cook. There were present: Mr. Dewar (chairman), Messrs. Turner, Griffin, Lowe, R. J. Blackwell, D. W. Blackwell, Dr. Campbell, Mr. Martin, Messrs. Saunders, W. J. Craig and Dr. Geo. Wilson.

Moved by Mr. Love, seconded by Mr. Turner, that the Board of Education of the City of London have learned with deep regret of the sudden death on July 14 of their late respected and esteemed colleague, Mr. James B. Cook. By his death the city has lost a faithful public servant, and one whose advice and services in the cause of the education of the young were esteemed of great worth and value. His services were especially valuable in seeking to implant in the youth of our schools a praiseworthy devotion of love and loyalty to our common country, which resulted in the successful inauguration and carrying out of the school children's annual demonstration known as "The Hoisting of the Flag," which will remain a deserved tribute to his name and memory. That this board also desires to place on record their sympathy with his sorrowing wife and family in this their time of bereavement, and that a copy of this resolution be suitably engrossed and forwarded to them. Carried unanimously by a standing vote.

In opening the meeting the chairman expressed his sense of personal loss by Mr. Cook's death, and also his appreciation of Mr. Cook as a man and his valuable services as a trustee.

Mr. Love, in moving the resolution, said he had the pleasure of a long acquaintance with Mr. Cook, and during all that time he had never seen him exhibit other than a kindly and tolerant spirit towards all his fellow creatures, and Mr. Cook's fellow members all joined in expressing the kindest feelings towards him.

Mr. R. J. Blackwell moved and George J. Griffin seconded that the board attend the funeral in a body as a further mark of esteem. Carried.
