Miss Yaw's voice will be the better appreciated by musicians. When Nilsson sang the high F sharp in Mozart's "Magic Flute," her listeners fairly labored between rapture and hysteria. Miss Yaw sings high F sharp without the slightest effort, and sus-tains the note with the sweetest quality. If any have supposed that Miss Yaw, with her marvelous range, is merely a musical freak, they are very much mistaken. Her voice throughout its entire range is sweet, expressive and sympathetic. She reaches the highest and lowest notes with much less effort than the ordinary singer, and sustains them with faultless accuracy.
