FROM LONDON TO PEKIN. London, Aug. 3 .- The directors of the Siberian Railroad are already figuring upon the time table from London to Pekin, which will go into effect in July, 1901. The journey will occupy ess than fifteen days, as follows: The train, four hours from London, will ave Ostend for Warsaw, distance 1,-2 kilometers, and will reach the latplace in 19 hours, at the rate of 80 lometers, over 49 miles, an hour, The distance from Warsaw to Batraki, 2.219 kilometers, will be accomplished 341/2 hours, at the rate of 64 kilometers an hour. Russian trains are much slower than those on the west European systems. From Batraki to helybinsk, where the new Siberian line actually commences, the distance is 1,127 kilometers, and it will be 2 made in 21 hours, at the further reduced sped of 53 kilometers an hour. From Chelybinsk to Vladivostock the distance is 9,283 kilometers, and it will be made at a mean speed of 42 kilometers, and will take 22 hours. The New Deal.

Important Statement on Canada's Trade Departure.

Hon. David Mills Speaks of the Powers Which the Dominion Possesses and Britain Recognizes.

(Globe London Correspondence.) At the request of the Globe corre the imperial government in denounce ing the Belgian and German treaties.

Senator Mills said: "There are two points of view from which this question may be discussed: the propriety of the course as a mere state to bind a colony having selfgovernment by such treaties. I preme it is the latter proposition upon nce Canada had asked to be released from the obligation of these treaties there would be but one course open to the British government, if we peradvisers of her Majesty when these eaties were negotiated, went beyond the boundaries which the constitution ermitted since parliamentary govern ent in the colonies has been estab shed. They, from the force of habit followed the practice of their predecessors in like matters, without carefully considering the extent to which self-government in the colonies limited their authority. You see, her Majesty is the sole medium of communication Lord Salisbury further said: "The credit of Greece in the European mar- edly her constitutional advisers in the negotiations of treaties.

TREATY IS A COMPACT. "But at this point it seems to me there is considerable conflict hought. A treaty is a compact. not a law. Her Majesty outside of arliament, except in colonies acquired by conquest and to whom responsible government has not been conceded, cannot change the law in any part of the empire. Canadian Fresh Fish No Longer Enter the U.S. Free.

A Ridiculous Assertion About "Cheap" Canadian Labor.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug.3.—A special from Erie to the Express says: The ruling of the assistant secretary of the treasury upon the question submitted by the Sandusky Fish Company, of Erie, as to what fish were dutiable, settles a point at this port, which is of benefit to the local fishermen. Under the Mc-Kinley tariff bill the large dealers were leasing their twine to Canadians and without paying; duty. The fact that laor is cheap in Canada enabled the fish dealers to get their fish very cheap, and that fixed the price for fish caught in American, waters by smaller fishermen, who could not afford to furnish twine for the Canadians. The Wilson bill let in fresh fish free of duty. The Dingley b'ill states that none but fish caught ir, the great lakes and fresh vaters by American citizens can be adnitted free of duty. Dominion provide that none but citizens of the Dominion may fish in Canadian waters. If the dealers on this side bring in fresh fish from Canada now they must pay the duty of one-fourth of a cent per pound. Under the old regulations the Erie fish dealers brought into Erie anywhere from 50 to 100 tons a year, and that supply at times killed the fishing in the waters fis/nermen are greatly pleased with the provisions of the Dingley bill, as it will ye some measure of protection against heap Canadian labor, and the duty on the fish will keep up the price on this side of the lake.

The captain' says not even those who are now at Skaguay or Dyea will be able to reach the interior this winter.
