

496 Prisoners Confined in London Jail During the Year.

Cost of Maintenance Materially Lower Than in 1898-Interesting Statistics.

Governor Boston, of the county jail, has completed his report for the year ending Sept. 30, 1899. It shows the number of prisoners committed to have been 467, a decrease of 30 compared with 1898. The cost this year per prisoner was 5.5 cents, considerably less than last year, when the cost was 6.17 cents. For food, clothing, etc., the cost was \$2,050 77; and this with officers' salaries totaled \$5,906 13. This is \$725 09 less than for 1898, when the cost totaled \$6,631 23. The reduction is in a great measure due to excellent and economical management.

The number of prisoners in custody on Oct. 1, 1898, was 29. The total number confined during the year was 496-459 men and 37 women. The number committed under the age of 16 was 13, and over the age of 16 was 454. Of those committed 226 were for the first time, 73 for the second, 31 for the third and 137 for more than the third. Number committed for want of se-

curities, 2; unsound mind, 16; acquitted on trial, 174; discharged by judges' order, 41; allowed to go on suspended sentence, 7; awaiting trial, Sept. 30, 7; and 238 were sentenced for any period, making a total of 467. Of this num-ber 89 men were sent to the Central Prison, 4 women were sent to the Mercer Reformatory, 5 boys to the re-formatory and 172 men and 12 women remained in jail until the expiration of their sentence. For 30 days 119 were committed; over 80 days, 34; over 60 days, 24: over two months, 18: over three months, 2; over four months, 2; over five months, 20; over nine months 4: over one year, 7; over two years, in penitentiary, 5; boys sent to reformatory for any period, 4; number of prisoners executed, 1; making a total of 238, of whom 222 were men and 16 women. The number of prisoners dis-charged by the county judges was 21; number found guilty and sentenced, 39, making a total of 60. Cost of main-tenance of 143 prisoners was defrayed by the government, and 324 by the municipalities. The total number of days government prisoners were in custody was 3,244, and the total number of
