CASE IN LOBO

Several Places Quarantined by

Board of Health. The smallpox case in Lobo has caused considerable commotion. Five churches, three public schools, the Coldstream public library and four private houses have been quarantined,

and general vaccination is under way. The patient is Andrew McVicar, son of John McVicar, whose farm is on the Sarnia road, half a mile east of Poplar Hill. Arthur, who is 22 or 23 years of age, had been attending a dental college in Detroit, and a few weeks ago a smallpox subject was taken to the college for dissection. Before the stu-dents were quarantined, young Mo-Vicar came home. That was two weeks ago, and for about a week the young man went about among his friends extensively, and several friends visited at the McVicar house. On Thursday last Arthur did not feel well. He grew worse, and on Monday a rash broke out. Dr. P. L. Graham was summoned on Tuesday afternoon, and pronounce ed the trouble smallpox. He at once quarantined the house and called a prompt action was taken. The two Baptist Churches and the Disciples Church in Poplar Hill, the Quakers' Church in Coldstream, and the Baptist Church on the town line between Lobo and Williams, the Coldstream public library, school sections No. 3, 4 and 10 Lobo, and the residences of F. Staples and I. Zavitz, brothers-in-law of the patient, were quarantined. Notice was also sent to the authorities in Strathroy, where the residence of Dr. Mc-Vicar was quarantined. Dr. McVicar is a brother of the patient, and on Thursday his mother left the family residence to visit in Strathroy. members of the family at home with Arthur are his sister and father only. Dr. Graham this morning said the young man was not suffering greatly, and that he was progressing as well as could be expected. He had been vaccinated in Detroit just before coming home.
