Toronto, Aug. 10-8 p.m.—The great heat still continues in Ontario, and the greater portion of the United States, but conditions are becoming more favorable to a change shortly to more moderate temperature. Toronto again records the highest temperature in Canada, 95°. Rain continues to fall heavily in Alberta, and some heavy local thunderstorms have occurred from Lake Superior to the Atlantic. Minimum and maximum temperature: Victoria, 23-49; Kamloops, 56-70; Calgary, 40-58; Qu'Appelle, 58-66; Winnipeg, 58-82; Port Arthur, 60-76; Parry Sound, 70-84; Toronto, 70-86; Ottawa, 72-86; Montreal, 70-82; Quebec, 66-70; Halifax, 60-86.

Local temperature: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Friday, Aug. 10, were: Highest, 94.8°; lowest, 74°. Today (Saturday) the sun rose at 5:17 a.m. and sets at 7:28 p.m. The moon rises at 7:36 p.m. and sets at 8:15 a.m.

SUDDEN DEATH OF MR. R. GRAY.

The death occurred yesterday afternoon of Mr. Richard Gray, of Mary street, from the rupture of a blood vessel. Deceased, who was well-known in popular circles, followed the calling of a bricklayer, and was at work all morning in West London. Not feeling well, he proceeded to the house of a friend, Mr. Smith, of Wilson avenue, Mr. Gray when Mr. Smith returned to wake him he found that he had apparently been dead for some time. Coroner Piper made an investigation and decided an inquest unnecessary. Deceased leaves a widow and family.

SUGAR BEET WASTE AS MANURE.

Germans are making use of sugar beet waste as manure, and the example is one that might well be followed by farmers in the middle west. One of the waste products of the factories that convert beets into molasses is a residue known as brown lys or molasses dregs, and it is a substance which in the past it has been difficult to dispose of satisfactorily. When mixed into manure it is said to be a most effective fertilizer, and it is so offensive as to annoy the whole neighborhood. According to a report by the United States consul at Magdeburg, a process has now been found which obviates the difficulties, including bad odors, dangerous waste, and inconvenient form. By this process the molasses lys is changed into a dry substance which can be stored and eventually spread on fields and is an excellent manure. The fertilizer now sells for 72.5 cents per 100 pounds. The product will be valuable, like the cotton seed that once grew in waste. It is said that refuse will be able to secure higher net profits from this manure than now result from the manufacture of saline and potash. There is some talk of applying the process from Europe and the waste materials of other industries.

AT WALKERVILLE.

They left London at 7:30 o'clock yesterday morning and arrived at Walkerville at 9:50 o'clock. During this portion of the trip they were accompanied by General Agent C. C. Young. At Sarnia they were met by General Manager Woollett, who had then conveyed in private cars, through the town, to a special train that was in readiness. It left Sarnia at 10:10 o'clock, and arrived at Walkerville at 2:40 o'clock. During that time Mr. Woollett pointed out to the party the various places of interest, and especially those commercially important districts through which they had passed. Every arrangement had been made for the guests' comfort, and in respect to their entertainment and refreshment Mr. Woollett was assisted by two courteous attendants.

AT WALKERVILLE.

In Walkerville the Londoners became the guests of Hiram Walker & Sons' Company. In the dining room of their palatial offices, covers had been spread for 25 people. Together with the civic party, Mr. Frank H. Walker, Mr. E. C. Walker and Mr. J. H. Walker and Dr. King, of Kingsville, made up the gathering.

After an excellent dinner, Mayor Rumball, speaking for the visitors, thanked the Messrs. Walker for their hospitality. While speaking, in reply, Mr. F. H. Walker, who is president of the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway Company, said that he was glad that so many had gone on the trip, so that they would know something of the splendid country that was to be brought into such close connection with London. He wished to correct an erroneous impression that this trip was an opportunity for the company to curry favor with the aldermen; it was simply a business-like method of acquainting them with the extent and fertility of the territory that would become tributary to London by the new extension.

Mr. Mattinson, president of the board of trade, spoke briefly of the pleasure he had experienced in passing through the rich lands of Essex and Kent, and also of his appreciation of the company's hospitality.

In speaking about the trip and its aim, Mayor Rumball said that he was delighted with what he had seen along the line of the L. E. and D. R. R., and with the hospitality that had been extended to the delegation. The memory of such pleasant events, he said, would not alter opinions, and he assured the gentlemen present that when the proposed extension of the lease came up for consideration it would be handled in a business-like way.

Vice-president King, of Kingsville, spoke as a representative resident of the L. E. and D. R. R. Company, in saying that it had long been their desire and determination to become connected with a commercial center such as London. He mentioned several ex-

THROUGH A FAIR COUNTRY

Pleasant Trip Made By Several Aldermen and Representative Shippers.

In a Special Train They Travel Over the L. E. and D. R. R. System.

View the Districts That Will Soon Be Directly Connected With This City—Handsomely Entertained in Walkerville.

Some days ago, when Mr. F. H. Walker, president of the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway, was in this city, he conferred with Mayor Rumball in an informal way regarding the request that the company will soon make to have the lease of the London and Port Stanley Railway extended for twenty years. At that time he cursorily explained the causes that actuated the company in this matter. It is the intention to begin constructing a line from Ridgetown to St. Thomas. The country through which their line run will thus be brought into direct connection with this city. Mr. Walker said at that time that no estimate of the advantage such a connection would be to London could be made unless the country were seen. He proposed that the council and some representative business men go over the company's lines, see for themselves the fertility of the districts tapped, and gain a personal knowledge that would assist them when the matter was being considered.

As the result of this suggestion and a subsequent invitation, the following gentlemen went from here to Sarnia, and thence by way of Chatham and Walkerville, to Walkerville: Mayor Rumball, Ald. Winnett, Jolly, Wray, Plant, Winder, Brenner, Garratt, Dreaney, Stevenson, Cooper, City Clerk Kingston, Auditor Jewell, John Mattinson (president board of trade), ex-Ald. R. W. Bennett, A. B. Greer, John Forrestal, W. C. Allen, A. T. McMahon and S. Ewart.
