DARING FIREMEN!

At the Risk of Their Own Lives Rescue Two Old Women From Almost Certain Death.

New York, April 29.—With splendid daring and at the risk of their lives, two firemen last night went into a burning apartment house at No. 1,112 Amsterdam avenue, and rescued two old women from what appeared to be almost certain death. The firemen were Matthew J. Cummings and John McClair, of hook and ladder No. 23. The women rescued were Mrs. Elizabeth Niver, 65, and her sister, Mrs. Eliza Moore, 86 years old. The fire was started by children on the top floor playing with matches. The firemen made desperate efforts to reach the fifth floor by the regular stairway, but flames drove them back. Then they rushed up to the fifth floor of the next house and over the fire escape to the front windows of No. 1,112. McClair waited outside and Cummings went in on hands and knees through the dense smoke. The crowd below watched silently for the firemen to re-appear. At length McClair was seen to reach in and take somebody from Cummings. It was Mrs. Niver, who had been found unconscious in the kitchen. McClair hurried with her to the street, while Cummings crawled back into the flames. Just as the captain of the company was ordering other men up to the rescue, Cummings was seen to stagger to the window, carrying Mrs. Moore. She was unconscious and Cummings was not far from it. The crowd cheered like mad when Cummings made his way down to the street. He soon went back with his comrades, fighting the fire. Mrs. Moore was burned severely and may not recover. Mrs. Niver was painfully scorched.

BOER INVADERS REAPPEAR.
Cape Town, April 28.—The Boer invaders returned again in the Richmond district of Cape Colony. Among the prisoners captured in a fight at Honeyest Kloof, which resulted in a complete defeat for the Boers, was a cousin of Mr. Sauer, the former commissioner of public works.

Cape Town, April 29.—A party of Boers blew up the railroad between Graspan and Belmont, Cape Colony, in three places, April 27, apparently with the intention of intercepting a train carrying British troops. The damage done was slight and was quickly repaired.

TWENTY LIVES LOST IN A SNOWSLIDE!
Sensational report of a Courier From Sunrise City, Alaska.

Port Townsend, Wash., April 29.—Jacob Rush, who has spent three years in Alaska, returned from Valdez on the steamship Senator yesterday. Just before sailing from Valdez for Japan, Mr. Rush says a courier arrived at Valdez from Sunrise City, stating that a snow-slide had occurred at that place on April 12, in which twenty or more lives were lost and a number of houses buried beneath snow and ice.

The courier left Sunrise shortly after the slide had occurred and could not give full particulars. Mr. Rush says Valdez is crowded with idlers who are anxiously awaiting the commencement of work on the government trail to the interior. He reports that the hospital is full of sick men.

PARIS VISITED BY A DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.
Livry Stable, Barn and a Number of Rigs and Horses Burned.

Paris, Ont., April 29.—A fire broke out between 12 and 1 o'clock last night in Mr. J. J. Watson's livery stable on William street, and the building, with its contents, and an adjoining barn occupied by the Dominion Express Company, were completely destroyed. Nearly all Mr. Watson's rigs were burned, as was Chalmers & Co.'s horse, the latter being valued at \$500. Mr. Watson's loss will be in the neighborhood of \$100,000. The cause of the fire is not yet known.

PINO CAMP CAPTURED.
Manila, April 29.—Capt. Wilson Chase, with a detachment of the 21st Infantry, on April 25 surprised the camp of the insurgent general, Calles, at Dugout, nine miles northeast of Cavinti, province of Laguna. Calles was at his camp, but escaped. Capt. Chase's force captured his adjutant-general, five other of his staff officers, fourteen men, twenty rifles, a large amount of ammunition and stores and all the papers and personal effects of the Filipino general. Whisperings of the Wires.

Mr. Halliday's election in North Bruce has been protested.

A case of snailpox is reported in the vicinity of Waterloo town.

Gabriel Bergeron, of Lancaster, was struck and killed by a train.

The congregation of Floor Street Baptist Church, Toronto, has accepted with regret Rev. C. A. Eaton's resignation.

Two tanks of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company and their contents, about 200,000 gallons of coal tar, were burned at Sydney, C. B.

The body of Father Joly, the Roman Catholic priest whose disappearance caused such a sensation, has been found in the Lake of Two Mountains, Quebec.

The census returns so far published of the British Isles show that the movement of population from the country to the cities continues unchecked.

At Whitcomb Station, Man., C. W. Blank, a German farmer, shot and killed another German named A. Radke. They had a row over cattle. Blank gave himself up at Winnipeg.

The bank robbers who have been doing alibion business for three or four years made another haul on Friday night at Brighton, Mich., when the private bank of J. Baetcke, in that village, was looted and \$10,000 was taken.

Frank Olson, cashier, and J. S. Stangroom, bookkeeper of the defunct Scandinavian-American Bank, of New Whatcom, Wash., have been arrested on warrants charging them with receiving deposits after the failure of that institution.

Mr. Jabel Robinson, jun., C. E., son of the Dominion member for West Kelowna, has been appointed engineer at Port Macleod for the Northwest Government. Mr. Robinson has been working on the Trent Valley Canal for several months.

Oil may be gushing from the ground near Ramsay's Corners if the operations now going on there turn out as expected, says an Ottawa dispatch, and it is said the Standard Oil Company is negotiating for the control of the property. Oil boring operations are also being carried on near Clarence Creek and the Temeron district.

THE WHOLE FAMILY WERE CREMATED!

Father, Mother and Three Children Perish—Baby Born During Progress of the Fire.

Houston, Tex., April 29.—In a fire which destroyed a livery stable and three residences yesterday morning, five persons were burned to death—Jop Copping, his wife and three children. A negro has been arrested on the charge of having started the fire. The body of his employer for having discharged him. In the ruins the found the bodies of the victims, among them being an infant which had been born to Mrs. Copping during the progress of the fire. Its body was found with its mother.

Mrs. Jeff Hopper jumped from the burning building and both were badly injured. The fire started in a livery stable, over which seven families resided, and the building was a mass of flames when the firemen arrived. A crippled woman, Mrs. Thompson, escaped from the building, and says she saw the Copping family run back into their rooms from the hallway, and that was the last seen of them alive.

Fond du Lac, Wis., April 29.—Israel Raymond, watchman at the Guernsey refrigerator factory, was burned to death in the fire which destroyed that establishment on Saturday night. The property loss is \$150,000, partially insured.

McLambro, Ill., April 29.—In a fire which destroyed George Hoffman's livery stable on Saturday night, J. M. Grimes, hostler, was burned to death.

SESSION MAY END MAY 20

Speculation as to the Probable Duration of the Present Parliament.

Ottawa, April 29.—The probable duration of the session is a question which is now engaging the minds of politicians. Three dates were named in the hearing of the House correspondent as likely to close the session—May 15, May 20 and June 15. The first and last of these dates may be dismissed as impossible. About the 20th of May is the most likely, although a strong desire among the majority of members to wind up business and go home before the Queen's Birthday.

BRITISH COLUMBIA LEGISLATURE.
Vancouver, B. C., April 29.—The government has offered to reduce the present rate of gross earnings of the railway company from 4 to 2 per cent, as the share of the province. The proposition is suggested. The probability now is that the whole question will lay over to a special session of the legislature in July or August, called for the purpose of discussing this subject. Only estimates for the fiscal year, ending June 30, 1902, were brought down on Saturday. The receipts are placed at \$2,475,335, and the expenditure at \$2,475,335. Budget speech today.
