

Constantinople, Sept. 3. - On the anniversary of his accession, Tuesday, the Sultan received in audience at the palace the heads of the religious communities, and the ecumenical patriarch made a speech of congratulations. In reply thereto, after thanking the patriarch and others present for their good wishes, his majesty, contrary to precedent, spoke at some length, as

"All my desire is for the welfare of the population, without distinction of race or religion. As to the detestable and regrettable deeds to which the patriarch alluded, I am convinced that the movement does not proceed sponfrom the population, but, is instigated from abroad. neasures taken will insure tranquility. I call God to witness the sincerity of
