

According to a statement made by Mr. Thomas Southworth, when he was forestry commissioner, the annual increase was 150 feet board measure per acre per year. If there were 40,-000,000 acres of preserve, with a yeargrowth of 6,000,000 feet, valued at \$5 per thousand, there would be a venue of \$30,000,000, according to Mr. Southworth's figuring. If the province had 6,922,000 acres of timber preserves, Mr. MacKay stated, it was not getting out of forestry as much as it should. The annual loss by decay falling trees, etc., was considerable, and great care should be taken to preserve the forests. 


