PLAN GENERAL STRIKE

Labor Leaders Are Sent to Prison for Contempt.

Philadelphia, Nov. 15.—Plans for a general strike by wageworkers throughout the country for a period of two weeks beginning on the day the officers weeks beginning on the day the others of the American Federation of Labor are imprisoned for contempt of court were inaugurated here today at a meeting of the Central Labor Union. Resolutions to this effect were unanimously adopted by the union, which represents about 75,000 workers in many lines of employment in this city. Copies of the resolution were sent to the committee of the American Federation of Labor now in session in Toronto, and it was decided to appoint a committee of five in this city to perfect plans by which or-ganized and unorganized wageworkers would unite to make the strike effective.
