SCOTT CASE SENT OVER TO THE WINTER ASSIZES

Action to Break Will of Late
Harvey Scott Has Been
Postponed.

The final case on the list, and one of the most important set down for a hearing at the assizes, was postponed until the winter assize court in January next this morning. This was the action of Wesley Scott, against Vincent et al. the executors of his father's estate, to break the deceased's will. Wesley Scott claims that in 1885 he made a contract with his father, by which he was to work and live on the farm and come into possession of the estate at his father's death. Harvey Scott was killed, and when the will was read it was discovered that the property had been given to Harvey's nephew, Arthur Scott, of Thorndale. Wesley now seeks to have the contract carried out or in the alternative he asks damages, as provided for by the contract.

ALIMONY CASE SENT TO THE WINTER ASSIZES

Glendenning Vs. Glendenning Will Be Tried by a Jury.

The case of Martha Glendenning, of this city, against her husband, Andrew Glendenning, of Toronto, for alimony, was transferred to the jury sittings of the winter assizes at the request of Mr. Edmund Meredith, K. C., solicitor for the plaintiff, at the assize court by Judge Teetzel yesterday afternoon. It is alleged that a very important witness is ill at present and therefore unable to attend court.

Mr. and Mrs. Glendenning were married in Feb. 16, 1889, and resided for some years in McGillivray Township. During 1905 they kept a store in Cobalt. This is where the trouble is said to have commenced when a school teacher boarded with the plaintiff and defendant. Mr. Glendenning is now living in Toronto, where he conducts a grocery business, it is said.

CASE WAS THROWN OUT BY JUDGE

Susan Shore Vs. John A. Jones Did Not Reach the Jury.

The action of Susan Shore against her nephew, John H. Jones, for damages for false arrest, was thrown out without being sent to the jury at the fall assizes yesterday afternoon. The evidence showed that there had been numerous family rows, and that the action grew out of a spirit of vindictiveness.

Mrs. Shore had been summoned before Squire Chittick by her nephew to answer a charge of deliberately destroying the property on which she lived, near Lambeth, and which Jones had purchased from Mr. Shore. One charge was to the effect that Mrs. Shore had placed a quantity of salt at the bottom of a grapevine. This case was dismissed by the magistrate. "Yesterday's action," said the judge, "appeared to be brought in an effort to 'even up' for the case in the magistrate's court. As the relations be-

tween the relatives were somewhat strained, Jones was perhaps justified in summoning his aunt when he discovered conditions that were at least suspicious.

"However, the plaintiff in the action had failed to show that there was any maliciousness in the magistrate's court case, and, therefore, no damages could be given."

This was the last jury case on the card, and the jurors were paid off and dismissed.

SENT FOR TRIAL

Toronto Jeweller Alleged To Have Violated Gold Plate Marking Act.

Toronto, Oct. 6.—Sidney H. Lee, of the firm of T. H. Lee & Co., Limited, was committed for trial on \$200 bail by Magistrate Denison this morning for an alleged violation of the gold and silver plate marking act. Mr. Lee admitted having sold American gold-filled watches, each accompanied by a guarantee that they would wear for 25 years. The guarantee is the part to which John Jennings, of the Dominion Government, objected to as being a breach of the act.

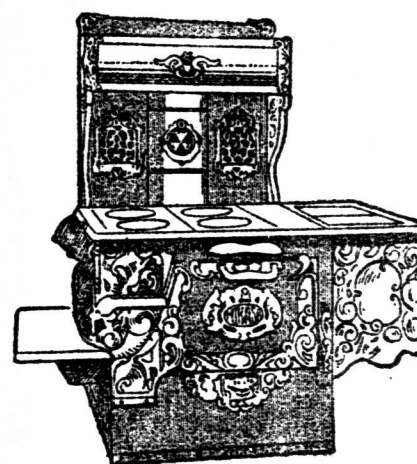

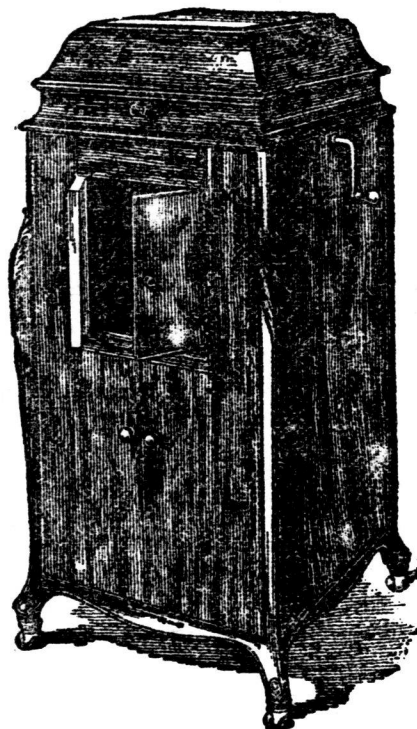
