The homestretch was in very bad condition, and as the pony pacer is a great finisher he believed that this spoiled his chances, as he would be in the heavy going when he commenced his usual spurt. He held the management a strong argument, but finally allowed the horse to start. The pony then went out and trimmed the field in three straight heats, and now the owner believes that he owns a real

Well-Behaved Horse.
While he is a well-behaved horse. when it comes to racing, the diminutive Canadian stallion is a demon in his stall, and more than one person bears marks of his savagery. His present groom takes no chances with him, and when leading him always carries a cudgel with which to repel attacks. The horse is afraid of one person, and that is Nat Ray, the steeplechase jockey, who drives him in his races. Ray can make the illtempered pony eat out of his hand; in fact, just such horses are his delight, and back in the days when he was riding the "leapers," he favored those which the other jockeys were afraid of. His early experience on the harness turf was with the hobbled pacer, John McEwen, 2:081/4. one of the worst-tempered animals which ever looked through a bridle. He had grooms and trainer alike stepping ise, but Ray conquered him and won many good races with him on half-mile tracks.

Horse Is Balky. Knight Onwardo is a rather notional horse when scoring, particularly when returning after the recall bell been sounded. Sometimes he will stop and refuse to budge. Ray will humor him for a minute or so, then threaten him with the whip, although he never strikes him except at the finish of a heat. The little fellow will finally give in and do what his teamster wants him to do, although in a manner which gives the impression that he would like to bite a piece out of the grandstand. Aside from his ill-temper, he is a great lit-tle race-horse, his performances throughout the season entitling him to rank next to Joe Patchen II., among the stake pacers which have

shown on the Grand Circuit. The Patchen horse, however, ranks in a class by himself as far as the other horses which he has been meeting are concerned, but the circuit followers are anxiously awaiting time when he will hook up with the Colorado colt, Braden Direct, who set the world's record for four-year-olds at 2:03% during the Grand Circuit meeting at North Randall. This colt left the big ring after the Pittsburg meeting and has been racing in the west, where he is keeping up his winning career. Starting at Richmond Lock and finishing at Tower Bridge at a quarter past seven this morning, she was as fit as a fish, and ready to swim farther, but the members of the Sussex Motor Yacht Club and the press man who accompanied her urged otherwise, owing to the danger of the

Rose, proud at accomplishing a feat never achieved by a woman swimmer, intended swimming the English Channel, but the weather has been so inclement for two weeks, that she was prevented from attempting it. She. will sail for the United States in a few days and return for the channel swim next spring.

Bridges Are Crowded. For the Thames performance today all the London bridges were crowded with people cheering the plucky American as she swam past. Miss Pitonof used the breast stroke always, except in the heavy wash of steamers where the over-arm was necessary She chewed gum continuously. brandy. Americans in the crowd yelled, "Oh, you kid; hurrah for the Stars and

Directors Are Satisfied With Season Just Ended-Injuries to Players Cost Club Large Sum.

St. Thomas, Sept. 10. - Despite

several handicaps, the directors of the St. Thomas ball club, in the Canadian League, will just about break even, financially, this season. Here are a few outstanding features of the year's record: The new directors assumed \$1,000 of last year's liabilities, and paid Chaucer Elliott \$500 additional for the franchise.
