LONG SAYS CHURCHILL IS
"TALKING THROUGH HIS HAT"

Declares Suggested Arrest of
Bonar Law Is Advertising
Scheme.
[Canadian Press.]
Montreal, Aug. 19.—The suggested
arrest of Mr. Bonar Law is bombastic
nonsense and Mr. Churchill is talking
through his hat," said the Right Hon.
Walter Hume Long, M. P. for the
Strand division of London, former
chief secretary for Ireland, now on a
visit with his family to Canada, in
the course of an interview today.
"Mr. Churchill is merely advertising
himself," continued Mr. Long, and
said further that the Unionists had
not invited the Ulsterites to rebellion.

ful if the House of Commons would
