

Strikebreakers Were Badly Hurt by Mob in Indianapolis Streets.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 5 .- The first street car to be moved since the traction employees' strike was called on Friday night was deserted in the street today after strike-breakers had run it less than a mile through a constant hail of bricks. One strike-breaker

Four other strike-breakers and a number of patrolmen were less seriously hurt by the downpour of missiles that came from roofs and windows of buildings and the crowd in the streets from the time the car left the barns until it was abandoned at Illinois and North streets, about threefourths of a mile from the start.


