FIVE LOST LIVES BY LEAVING BOAT THAT DID NOT SINK

Schooner Was Later Picked Up in Good Shape With All Sails Set —Part of Her Crew Were Rescued and All Would Have Been Safe by Sticking to the Ship.

New Bedford, Mass., Nov. 5.—The faded yellow pages of the log-books of the New Bedford fishing fleet fail to record a mystery of the sea more baffling than that presented today, when the revenue cutter Gresham towed into port the Gloucester fishing schooner Annie M. Parker, which was picked up Monday with all sails set, her hold filled with fish and without a soul on board, 60 miles east of the Nantucket lightship. The death of the cook and the probable loss of five other lives, Vincent Nelson, and three of their mates, and the fact that their abandonment of the stranded schooner near Nantucket and the loss of life was unnecessary was not known to the crew until word reached them that the schooner was in port at New Bedford practically undamaged.

Survivors in Portland. Nine survivors of the Parker's crew reached here aboard the lumber schooner Tifton, from Jacksonville, which had picked them up from dories thirty miles off Nantucket Sunday morning, after they had been afloat 24 hours without food or drink. A tenth survivor, Harry Nelson, of Beverly, son of the captain, was left behind on the Boston fisherman Josie and Fluebe, exhausted from his experience, but hoping to find trace of his father.

Swept Overboard. Reuben Kenny, a cook, found a watery grave when he was swept overboard from a dory while his mates

looked on powerless to help. His name was at Glenwood, N. S. He leaves seven children. The missing men, besides Captain Nelson, are: Lester Fletcher, of Argyle Sound, N. S.; Ross Worthen, of Pubnico Head, N. S.; Thomas Landry, of Arichat, C. B.

In Good Shape. The British steamer Astrakhan, bound from New York for France, sighted the Parker on Monday, drifting about with all sails set. Boarding the schooner the officers of the steamer learned that she had evidently been abandoned in haste. Four of the eight dories usually carried on the fisherman were "nested" and lashed to the deck. The other dories were missing. The clothing and valuables of the captain and crew were found in their bunks. A few burned pieces of bread were all the food that was found in the galley, indicating that before leaving the crew had hastily gathered together a supply of provisions.

The schooner was not leaking, and appeared to be in perfect condition, except for the loss of one life, that was carried away possibly after the vessel was abandoned. Salt fish, valued at about \$8,000, filled the hold.

A prize crew from the Astrakhan was put in charge of the Parker, and they later turned her over to the Gresham.

ALBERT L. TURNER HAS TWO WIVES IN OTTAWA

One Woman Is Fifty Years Old and the Other Twenty-Five.

[Canadian Press.] Ottawa, Nov. 5.—Two women, claiming to be the wives of Albert Lovett Turner, have sworn out a warrant charging bigamy against the man who is now under arrest in Montreal, and will be brought to Ottawa tonight.

Wife No. 1, who is over 50 years of age, showed Chief Ross a certificate of her marriage to the accused on July 21, 1903. The ceremony took place in England. Turner had buried his first wife about one year previously. The lady was then Mrs. Emma Moore, a widow. Turner's second alleged victim, a young woman of 25, was Miss Marie Anne Lefebvre. She has in her possession a certificate of her marriage to Albert Lovett Turner, dated at Ottawa Feb. 23, 1910. Rev. Walter M. Loucks, of St. Matthew's Church, officiated. The two women are on the best of terms, and while here occupied the same room at their hotel.

STREET CAR RAN MILE THROUGH HAIL OF BRICKS

Strikebreakers Were Badly Hurt by Mob in Indianapolis Streets.

[Canadian Press.] Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 5.—The first street car to be moved since the traction employees' strike was called on Friday night was deserted in the street today after strike-breakers had run it less than a mile through a constant hail of bricks. One strike-breaker was taken from the car badly hurt.

Four other strike-breakers and a number of patrolmen were less seriously hurt by the downpour of missiles that came from roofs and windows of buildings and the crowd in the streets from the time the car left the barn until it was abandoned at Illinois and North streets, about three-fourths of a mile from the start.

At this point the trolley came off, and it became so dangerous for the strike-breakers that they laid down on the floor of the car, and after a few minutes, as a sign of surrender, threw out the controller and all their arms into the street. They were then taken in charge by strikers and policemen and later taken to jail.

The car was almost entirely wrecked, and the platform was covered with stones, bricks, pieces of coal and other missiles. When it was abandoned, no police were on it, but it was surrounded by patrolmen on foot and horseback.

The conference, which began early in the day, between the authorities, was still in session when the rioting took place.

PREDICTS BIG CHANGES IN GOVERNMENT SOON

Hon. C. J. Doherty To Be Chief Justice in Place of Sir C. Fitzpatrick.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, Nov. 5.—The Daily Mail today announces a number of cabinet changes which, it says, "may not be announced in the immediate future, but will be an fait accompli before many months are over."

The changes include the translation of Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, to the chief justiceship of Canada, because Chief Justice Sir Charles Fitzpatrick "is not entirely satisfied with the tameness of a judicial position." "Sir Charles will become," according to the Mail, "other Canadian high commissioner in London or a member of the judicial committee of the privy council."

Mr. Doherty's successor as minister of justice, it is expected, will be the Hon. Arthur Meighen. Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways and canals, is weary of political game, and would like to have been appointed before now Lieutenant Governor of Ontario.

Dr. Roche, minister of the interior, though somewhat improved in health by his trip abroad, is far from being a well man, and would be glad to relinquish the cares of office. Amongst these prominent mentions are probable successors to Messrs. Cochrane and Roche are W. B. Northrup and Major J. P. Currie.

Nantelet for Commission. Hon. Bruno Nantelet, says the Mail, will go to the railway commission, and Hon. Louis Coderre to the bench. Their successors would be Hon. T. C.

DECLARE ZEPEDA NOT TO BLAME FOR KILLING

Former Governor Caused Murder of Major-General Hernandez.

[Canadian Press.] Mexico City, Nov. 5.—Allentists today declared not responsible for his act Enrique Zepeda, another relative of Provisional President Huerta, and former governor of the federal district, who, while in office, entered the Belem prison on March 27 this year, and caused the murder of Major Gabriel Hernandez, a lieutenant of rural guards under the commandant administration.

Zepeda took a squad of mounted police to the prison, where Hernandez was confined as a political prisoner, ordered him out, and had him riddled with bullets by the men he commanded. Zepeda then had firewood piled in the prison courtyard and had the body of Hernandez placed on top, as a month ago, and a new inquiry ordered. STRATFORD BABY SCALDED TO DEATH

Tommy Ryan Had Boiler of Hot Water Spilled Over Him.

Collingwood Has 11 Smallpox Cases

All Patients Are Doing Well and No Serious Trouble Is Expected.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Collingwood, Nov. 5.—Discussing the reported outbreak of smallpox in this town, Dr. Donald McKay, medical officer of health, declared: "These reports of an epidemic of smallpox in Collingwood are greatly exaggerated. There is no epidemic. There is no

cause for alarm. There are but 11 cases, and all are in close quarantine. Some of these are almost completely recovered, and will soon be out of quarantine. Every precaution has been taken to check any further spread of the disease. The schools and theatres have been temporarily closed in order to facilitate the work of stamping out the disease, and a general vaccination of the children is taking place. In Collingwood there is no undue excitement. Business is being carried on as usual."
