SERVIANS CAPTURE 22,000 AUSTRIANS

Military Successes of Scrappy Little Nation Are Most Apparent.

A NEW CHIEF OF STAFF

Sir James Wolfe Murray Succeeds Sir Charles Douglas—Hindus Offer Aid.

TURKISH GUNBOAT SUNK.
LONDON, Dec. 11.—2:16 p.m.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Athens says that a Turkish gunboat has been sunk by a Turkish mine at the entrance to the Bosphorus.

SECOND RELIEF CARGO LANDS.
HALIFAX, Dec. 10.—Premier Murray was advised by cable today of the arrival at Devonport, England, today, of the steamship Doric. The Doric carried Nova Scotia's second cargo of mercy for the relief of the Belgians.

NEW CHIEF OF STAFF.
LONDON, Dec. 11.—3:45 a.m.—Lieut.-Gen. Sir James Wolfe Murray has been appointed chief of the Imperial general staff, in succession to the late Gen. Sir Charles Douglas.

OTTAWA ENLISTMENT SATISFACTORY.
OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—Fifty-five men of the army service mechanical transport division for the second contingent, will leave Ottawa for Toronto tomorrow night, and 75 of the same transport section will leave for Montreal. Enlistment has been most satisfactory in Ottawa.

GAVE COAL TO FLEET.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 10.—The British steamer Cairnhill, 34 days out of Newcastle, Australia, with 3,600 tons of coal for delivery at this city, arrived here today without her cargo. At Suva, she reported she was halted by a British tramp, whose name was withheld, and ordered to turn over 3,000 tons of coal for the British fleet.

ANXIOUS ABOUT MISSIONARIES.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 10.—Great Britain, through the embassy here, asked the State Department today whether it was true that British missionaries were being held as hostages at Beirut, Syria. The department immediately called Ambassador Montague, at Constantinople, directing him to ascertain the facts from the Turkish Government.

SERVIANS CAPTURE 22,000 MEN.
PARIS, Dec. 10.—10:10 a.m.—A dispatch to the Havas Agency from Nish, Serbia, says the total captures of the Serbians in battles fought with the Austrians from December 2 to December 7 were 121 officers and 22,114 men, 68 field pieces, 42 quick-firing, eight mortars, 13,000 rifles, 48 machine-guns, 1,500 tons of ammunition, 1,500 transport wagons, 150 hospital wagons, four ambulances, two treasury safes and 227 horses.

HINDU MILITARY CORPS.
VANCOUVER, Dec. 10.—Beta Singh, Baba Singh, Dr. Reganath Singh and other Hindus, have telegraphed the Minister of Militia, offering to raise a company of Hindus in British Columbia. Dr. Reganath Singh is an ex-warrant officer, and Beta and Baba have served in the Indian army.

A BERNSTORFF DREAM.
NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—A detail of the charges made by Count Von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador, that the Union Metallic Cartridge Company has shipped to Canada since October 8, 1914, 8,000 rounds of "quadruple bullet" for use in the British army, is contained in a letter sent to Count Von Bernstorff today by S. F. Pryor, vice-president and general manager of the Remington-Union Metallic Cartridge Company.

MOVE ALIEN PRISONERS.
PETAUWAWA MILITARY CAMP, Ont., Dec. 10.—One hundred Austrians, who are prisoners of war, arrived here today from Fort Henry, Kingston. The men were brought here by a special train. At Sharbot Lake, the guard from the Fourteenth Regiment of Kingston, turned over the prisoners to Col. J. M. Balderson, of Perth, commander of the Forty-Second Regiment, who had been ordered to furnish a guard of 100 men from his regiment. The alien enemies are to be housed during the war at the military camp here.

SPECIAL RELIEF FLAG.
NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Laden with a \$200,000 cargo of food for the relief of Belgians, the steamship Maskinonge sailed from New York tonight after a special flag-raising ceremony had taken place on the pier, under the direction of the American commission for relief in Belgium, which chartered the vessel.

CAUSED TROUBLE.
NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Dec. 10.—In connection with the report that Superintendent Ryckmann and another man of the United Company at Niagara Falls Centre were arrested today by a corporal's guard it was explained here this afternoon that Superintendent Ryckmann of the Dominion Chain Company, was not arrested but is required by the military authorities as a witness in regard to an alleged offence of one of the workmen.

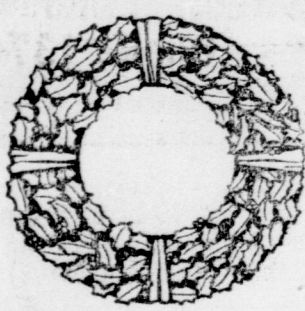

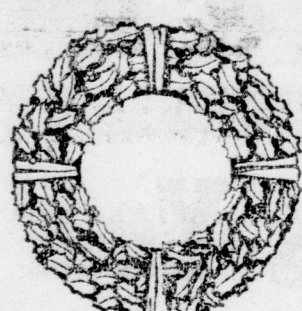

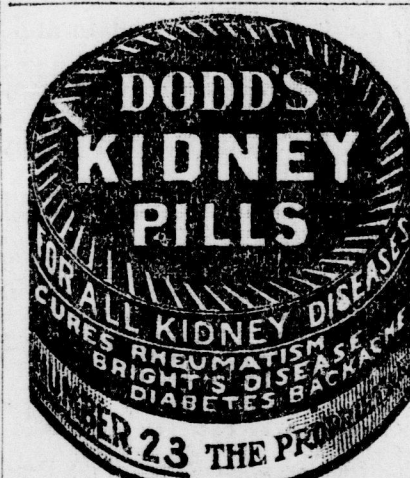
