ST. JOHN, N.B., Feb. 26.—The 26th annual meeting of the Canadian Rugby Union was held Saturday afternoon at the Ontario Athletic Commission's rooms, Richmond street west, with President W. Foulds, Toronto, in the chair.

In the morning the rules committee held a meeting and discussed a number of suggestions made in regard to the rules from the Intercollegiate and Interprovincial leagues.

Present at the meeting were: President Foulds, Vice-President R. P. Heister, Hamilton, and F. C. P. Roberts of Montreal. Secretary, Dr. G. E. Reid, London; Dr. Lorne Hewitt, Montreal, and W. A. Hewitt, Toronto.

It is likely that next year teams will be strictly limited to 20 men in uniform and 18 players to participate, and that teams will not be allowed to have more than that number of men in any game. Last year teams used more than 20 men in a game.

This new rule will be a protection for the smaller clubs who have not large squads of players.

College Suggestions.
The college suggestions were outlined by Dr. Montgomery as follows:

1. The college suggestion was to have a line after a rough or safety kick. Player may recover fumbled ball himself or forward pass in such cases not penalized.

2. Definite duties of referee and assistant referee (one name for umpire). Referee inflicts penalties, but otherwise officials have equal powers.

3. Head linesman to have additional authority and to be regularly appointed official. He is to call the "3-yard" interference rule. The head linesman is to be a regular player in games and optional in intermediate and junior series.

4. Legals to report to the penalty timekeeper instead of the head linesman. A record is to be kept of all substitutions.

5. Substitutes to be kept by the "shift" play, by which the ball may be snapped by any player on the line of scrimmage, not necessarily the quarterback.

6. Running interference is illegal on the line of scrimmage or in any part of the field whether the offender is offensive or not.

7. The Intercollegiate divided equally on the proposition to increase the interference from 2 to 4 yards on the line of scrimmage. They will accept the Canadian Union's decision on this point.

The Big Four Suggestions.
Mr. Simpson introduced two suggestions from the Interprovincial Union as follows:

1. Favor allowing a fake kick on the third down, irrespective of the fact that Aston Villa had won a game beyond the 3-yard line.

2. Favor reversion to the old rule whereby the side kicking the ball of a blocked kick on the third down possession, and calling a first down.

The views of the Intercollegiate were given in the following comment:

"Many visitors from the U. S. have expressed themselves as being greatly interested in the new rules, and a revision of our code should be discussed with caution."

These attracted a total attendance of 29,721. This applies in a general way to the many games leading up to the C. R. U. finals. May 1st and Sun N.Y. also ran."

The Success Achieved.
"As to the critics it would be but natural that with the advent of a new set of playing rules considerable criticism might arise. Before the opening of the playing season we met with some criticism, but am sorry to say not of a constructive character. However, our executive and rules committee were content to wait until after the playing season was over and stand or fall on the result. Perhaps the best vindication for those who advocated these rules is borne out by the fact that for the first time:

1. That no official in charge has suggested any radical changes.

2. That the public have shown absolute approval of the game as now played."

The following officers were elected: Honorary president, W. Foulds, Toronto; President, R. T. Isbister, Hamilton; Vice-president, Percy Roberts, Montreal; second vice-president, C. E. Chown, Winnipeg; third vice-president, John DeGruy, Toronto; secretary-treasurer, R. W. Brown, Toronto.
