FIND WHERE MILK GROWS AND HOW BERRIES RIPEN
Life Full of Interest at W. C. T. U. Camp, Opening July 1.

Any good-hearted club or person like to give a little shut-in-the-city girl a real summer outing, where she can wake up in the morning to bird and animal calls, with green grass and trees everywhere instead of sun-baked streets and city walls?

July 1 the W. C. T. U. summer camp is opening as usual down at Springbank, across the river from the pump-house, where portable houses have waited all winter, good as gold, for the holiday season, coming round again. Mrs. Ida Harrison, the camp's fairy godmother, goes down the week before, accompanied by Miss Emma Gurd, to get everything ship-shape for the coming of a party of young girls between the ages of 10 and 14. The rules, however, are not exactly those of the far-famed Medes and Persians. If a little girl under ten, even as young as eight, has an older sister in camp to look after her, she may successfully pull wires to get in. Housing, bedding, meals, milk and all are provided in the \$3.50 each charged for board. Half a dollar a day will buy all this for a little girl, with the fun thrown in.

In addition to relaxation features, the camp has educational as well, that, fortunately for the holiday-makers, are not recognized as such. For example, when members of camp go for milk, they can find out that it doesn't just come out of bottles or even a can. They make the acquaintance of the cow and the process of milking, separating milk from cream, and the manner in which butter for bread is made. They visit nearby fruit farms, and they see how currants, raspberries and gooseberries grow on bushes, and cherries and plums on trees, even if strawberries ripen lusciously on vines on the ground.

This year according to Mrs. Harrison, there is excellent assurance of a bridge just below the dam at the old site for the visitors who care to go out from the city. This piece of luck is due to the fact that the London district Latter-Day Saints are holding a camp the first ten days in July, and will find it necessary to build a bridge for reaching their camp headquarters from the car on the north side of the river, neighboring the W. C. T. U. summer colony.

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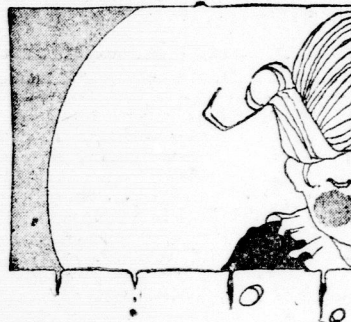
