GUILTY BY JURYSt. Thomas Man Will Be  
Sentenced At End of  
Assizes.Great Deal of Interest Dis-  
played in Case by  
Residents.

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 24.—A verdict of guilty was brought in at 11:45 on Tuesday night by the jury sitting on the case of Robert M'Guire, charged with entering the home of A. G. O. Boehmer, 2 Albert street, early in the morning of Sept. 12 last.

A great deal of interest has been shown in the case, and the courtroom was crowded with spectators, who eagerly waited for the decision of the jury.

For the defense the family of the accused stated that he was in the house on the night of the crime, but the alibi was overruled by Justice Latchford, who declared that the prisoner "was within striking distance" on that night.

The jury was out three-quarters of an hour, and following the verdict Judge Latchford stated that sentence would be pronounced at the end of the present assizes.

Outlines Robbery.

Crown Attorney A. McCrimmon opened the case with a short outline of the robbery and the circumstances surrounding it to familiarize the jury with the events that took place on the night of the crime.

He stated that the crown charged that three or four men had entered the Boehmer home about 1 o'clock on the morning of Sept. 12, looting the home till about 6:45 in the morning, and alleged that M'Guire was one of these men.

Mr. Boehmer was the first witness called by the crown. He told of leaving his home for New York at about 9 p.m. on the evening of Sept. 11. He had been informed while in New York that his house had been entered, and he returned home Wednesday morning. His car, in which the robbers had gone off, was found before his return. He had missed a club bag, several bottles of wine, a pair of binoculars, a cigarette case and a small sum of money. He identified the club bag, which was found the day after the robbery in a coal yard on Railway street, as his.

Mrs. Boehmer, who together with her little daughter and the gardener, John Scott, had been in the house when it was entered, was next called to the box and gave a detailed outline of the events that took place on the night of the robbery, climaxing her gripping testimony by identifying M'Guire as one of the desperadoes who had looted her home.

Locks Up House.

She told of locking up the doors and windows of the house on the night in question, and of retiring at about ten minutes to ten. About ten-thirty the telephone rang, but she did not bother to answer it. In the night she was awakened by a noise in the lower part of the house, and simultaneously the phone rang a second time. Mrs. Boehmer was thoroughly aroused, and hearing walking below, she had run to the rear room and awakened the gardener, John Scott. "Who's there, what do you want?" She had received no answer, and going down the stairs she was seized by two masked men. Mr. Scott had simultaneously gone down the rear stair, and had been

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Ambassador George Harvey Argues  
That Women Do Not Possess Souls

LONDON, Oct. 24.—"Have women souls?"

If they have souls there is no evidence of it in the Bible, according to the interpretation of Ambassador George Harvey, who addressed the Authors' Club here last night.

Col. Harvey, on the premises that women have no souls, deduced that the Ten Commandments apply only to men. "The fact is, of course," he said, "that women are not only not bound by, but freed at least by inference of any obligation to observe the requirements of our fundamental religious law."

He said there was no recognition in the decalogue of the possession of souls by women, and suggested that the Authors' Club assume the responsibility of writing a list of ten

commandments for women.

Col. Harvey cited the Fourth Commandment as evidence that the decalogue did not apply to women. The commandment, he said, orders all members of the household not to work on Sunday but the wife, he pointed out, Harvey said he believed the omission of "thy wife" in the commandment was deliberate because someone had to work on the Sabbath.

Even the commandment, "Thou shalt not steal" does not apply to women, he said. "Thou," in the commandments applies exclusively to men, he said, and the omission of "thy wife" in the commandment was deliberate because someone had to work on the Sabbath.

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SARNIA OFFICIALS  
ABSOLVE AUDITORCity Council Acquits William  
Simpson of Blame in Hydro  
Irregularities.

SARNIA, Oct. 24.—William Simpson, city auditor, was acquitted of all blame in connection with recent irregularities in the hydro commission which resulted in the dismissal of Manager J. E. B. Philips, at a meeting of the city council Tuesday night.

The council also commended the action of the mayor in dismissing the hydro manager.

CRERAR SOON TO  
MAKE DECISIONProgressive Leader Will Confer  
With Leading Members  
of Party.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 24.—Hong T. A. Crerar, Progressive leader in the federal house, frankly admits that the question of leadership of the party is bound to crop up at the meeting of the Progressive members of parliament to be held in Winnipeg on November 10, but there is no intention from him as yet to what developments are likely.

Saskatchewan Progressives expect the resignation of Mr. Crerar from the leadership of the Progressive Party will be received shortly and, accompanying it, his resignation from the House of Commons. There is an alternative, namely, that Mr. Crerar may decide to enter the Mackenzie King government, and to do this he will resign the presidency of the United Grain Growers, Limited.

But the former is regarded as more probable, in view of the fact that Mr. Crerar has found he will not be able to take any substantial body of Progressive support into the Liberal party with him in the event of his accepting that position. The Nominations convention settled things once for all in Saskatchewan. J. Fred Johnston, chief Progressive whip and M.P. for Last Mountain constituency, is one of the Progressives who have given full allegiance to Mr. Crerar, and supported his fusion plans. T. H. McClelland, M.P. for Battledore, is another.

When Mr. Johnston called a convention at Nominations for the purpose of discussing political issues with Mr. Crerar, it was taken for granted that the convention would be favorable to fusion. Several leaders among the farmers who were definitely opposed to submerging the identity of the Progressive party, including H. C. Fleming, a director of the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company, went to the convention in a sort of "die-hard" spirit.

All the agencies of the provincial government, the federal Liberal organization and the Crerar influence were represented there in the endeavor to get a favorable verdict. Nevertheless, when Mr. Fleming put his motion opposing any formal fusion or "working arrangement," the meeting carried it with only two dissenting votes, and any prospect of Saskatchewan for a coalition was forthwith discarded.

When the provincial executive of the Progressive party met in Regina Saturday there was not a single voice favorable to fusion. It was recognized that the temper of Progressive farmers would not permit anything of the kind.

What makes the question acute is the attitude of shareholders in the United Grain Growers, Limited. There has been increasing dissatisfaction at the fact that while Mr. Crerar is in receipt of a large salary as its president, half his time was given over to political work.

Mr. Crerar has, it is understood here, been returning to the company the amount of his seasonal indemnity at Ottawa.

A meeting of the shareholders of the U. G. G. is to be held within a few days now that it is taken for granted that the issue will be forced and Mr. Crerar asked to declare in which field he is going to serve.

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
