sworn to by every member of the Ku Klux Klan as given to The Advertiser by "Kleagle" Hignett:

"The oath of allegiance: 'I, in the presence of God and man, most solemnly pledge, promise and swear unconditionally, that I will faithfully obey the constitution and laws and will willingly conform to all regulations, usages and requirements of this society which do now exist or which may be hereafter enacted, and will render at all times loyal respect and steadfast support to the Imperial authority of same, and will heartily aid all official mandates, decrees, edicts, rulings and instructions of the I. W. thereof. I will yield prompt response to all summonses, I having knowledge of same, Providence alone preventing.'"

"The oath of secrecy is as follows: 'I most solemnly swear that I will forever keep sacredly secret the signs, words and grip and any and all other matters and knowledge of the regarding which a most rigid secrecy must be maintained, which may at any time be communicated to me, and will never divulge same, or even cause the same to be divulged to any person in the whole world unless I know positively that such person is a member of this order in good and regular standing. I not even then unless it be for the best interest of this order. 'I most solemnly swear and most positively swear that I will never tell to bribe, flattery, threats, passion, punishment, persecution, perjury, nor any enticement whatever coming from or offered by any person or persons, male or female, for the purpose of obtaining from me any secret or information of the order, or will die rather than divulge same, or help me God.'"

"The oath of fidelity is next sworn: 'I, before God and before these mysterious Klansmen, on my sacred honor do most solemnly and sincerely pledge, promise and swear that I will diligently guard and faithfully obey every interest of the Ku Klux Klan, and will maintain its social and dignity. 'I will swear that I will never recommend any person for membership in this order whose mind is unsound whose reputation I know is bad whose character is doubtful or whose loyalty to our country in any way is questionable. 'I swear that I will pay promptly all just and legal demands made on me to defray the expenses of the Klan and this order when same are due or called for. 'I swear that I will protect the property of the Ku Klux Klan of any nature whatsoever, and if any should intrude to my keeping I will properly keep or rightly use same, and will freely and promptly surrender same on official demand, or if I am banished from or voluntarily discontinue my membership in this order. 'I swear that I will most determinedly maintain peace and harmony in all the deliberations of the gatherings or assemblies from or voluntarily discontinue my membership in this order. 'I swear that I will most strenuously discourage selfishness and selfish political ambition on the part of any Klansman. 'I swear that I will never allow personal friendship, blood or family relationship nor personal, political, professional prejudice, malice nor will to influence me in casting my vote for the selection or rejection of any applicant for membership of this order. God being my helper. Amen.'"

"The oath of Klansmanship is sworn: 'I most solemnly pledge and swear that I will never slander, defraud, deceive or in any manner wrong the Ku Klux Klan, a Klansman, nor a Klansman's family, nor will I suffer same to be done if I can prevent. 'I swear that I will be faithful in tending and protecting the home, reputation and physical and business interest of a Klansman and that of a Klansman's family. 'I swear that I will at any time, without hesitation, go to the assistance or rescue of a Klansman in any way. At his call I will answer, and be truly Klanish toward Klansmen in all things honorable. 'I swear that I will never allow any animosity, friction nor ill-will arise and remain between myself and a Klansman, but will be constant in my efforts to promote real Klansmanship among the members of this order. 'I swear that I will keep secure myself a secret of a Klansman as same is committed to me in the sacred bond of Klansmanship, the crime of violating this solemn oath, treason against the United States of America, rape and malicious murder alone excepted. 'I most solemnly swear and affirm that to the government of the United States of America and any state or proof of which I may become a citizen, I solemnly swear an unqualified allegiance above any other kind of government in the

I here and now pledge my life, my property, my vote, and my sacred honor to uphold its flag, its constitution and constitutional laws, and will protect, defend and enforce same unto death. 'I swear that I will most zealously and valiantly shield and preserve, by any and all justifiable means and methods, the sacred constitutional rights and privileges of free public schools, free speech, free press, separation of church and state, liberty, white supremacy, just laws, and the pursuit of happiness against any encroachment of any nature by any person or persons, political party or parties, religious or foreign, native, naturalized or foreign, of any race, creed, lineage or tongue whatsoever. 'All to which I have sworn by this oath I will seal with my blood, be thou my witness, Almighty God, Amen.'"

"The Dedication. At the conclusion of the oath the candidates lower their hands and are addressed as follows: 'Sirs—Have each of you without mental reservation assumed your oath to the "Invisible Empire"?'"

"On receiving answers in the affirmative the official continues: 'Mortal man cannot assume a more binding oath. Character and courage alone will enable you to keep it. Always remember that to keep this oath means to you honor, happiness and life. But to violate it means dishonor, dishonor and death. May honor, happiness and life be yours.'"

"The official then takes the vessel of dedication fluid from the altar. Holding it aloft, he proceeds: 'With this transparent, life-giving, powerful fluid, more precious, and far more significant than all the sacred oils of the ancients, I set each of you apart from the men of your daily associations to the great and honorable tasks which you have voluntarily allotted yourselves as citizens of the Invisible Empire and Knights of the Ku Klux. As a Klansman, may your character be as transparent; your life's purpose as powerful; your motive in all things

"The secret grip, signs and passwords are then entrusted to the new Klansman, and these Hignett refused to divulge. Usually after such meeting, a parade through the main streets of the city or town is held. Suddenly, through the darkness of the night, the weird bugle calls comes, giving the first intimation to the populace that the Klansmen are abroad. Local Klans march always two abreast at the head of the column the official ride on horseback, and a fiery cross, illuminated with electricity, is lifted high above from an automobile. With arms folded the members of the rank and file march silently. Denies Lawlessness. 'Is it true,' Keagle Hignett was

asked, "that the night riders sometimes take the law into their own hands?" "No, it is not true," he answered, emphatically. "Do they never drive alleged wrongdoers from town, administer tar and feathers occasionally, horse-whip when a whipping seems to be needed, and indulge in lynching?" "Absolutely not," declared the Kleagle. "I know certain stories are circulated to that effect, but it is done to discredit the Klan. No Klansman is allowed to take the law in his own hands by the constitution of the order. If he did, he would be expelled. If a Klansman killed, Klansmen would help bring him to justice."

"But the official giving the dedicatory sermon promises death if oaths are violated," persisted The Advertiser. "He means death socially; nothing else."

"The Klan, according to Mr. Hignett, is both a national and local movement. National headquarters are at Atlanta, Georgia. The state headquarters are secret. In Atlanta is located the imperial palace and the home of the emperor, Colonel William Joseph Simmons, V. D. M., LL.D. The home of the imperial wizard, W. H. Evans, is at Dallas, Texas. From national headquarters, all state and field appointments are made, and charters for local Klans are issued. At the head of each state, explained Mr. Hignett, is the king, Kleagle and his staff of officers. The Kleagle is the field worker, and he is the head of local Klans until they are fully organized. Each Klan then elects its own officers. Mysterious Names. The names of the officers of the Ku Klux Klan preserve the atmosphere of mystery. These titles, in part, are as follows: "Exalted Cyclops," or president of the local Klan. "Kludd," or vice-president. "Kludd," or lecturer. "Kludd," or chaplain. "Kludd," or secretary. "Kludd," or treasurer. "Kludd," or conductor. "Kludd," or inner guard. "Kludd," or outer guard. "Kludd," or investigator. "Night Hawk," in charge of candidates. To designate national officers the adjective "Imperial" prefixes the local name. The man in charge of all Klans is "Grand Dragon." Awe-inspiring, as well as mysterious, are the words used to designate days, weeks and months. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE GRANT COMES UP AGAIN

Spirited Discussion at Last Evening's Council Meeting, But Solution Deferred.

The Chamber of Commerce got caught in last night's council barage. "We're here to cut estimates," stated Ald. Drake. "We should cut out this \$2,500. Cut everything."

"But this is the only organization trying to bring in more industries," objected Ald. Burdick. "Did we not agree to let this ride at our last meeting?" asked Ald. Judd.

Mayor Wenige also opposed the cut. "Cut off \$1,000," suggested Ald. Drake, ready to compromise. Ald. Colbert moved to eliminate the entire appropriation, demanding to know where the city derived any benefit from the Chamber of Commerce, declining to see "eye to eye" with the mayor's claim that every progressive city needed a Chamber of Commerce.

Ald. Drake held out for a \$1,000 decrease, while the mayor with Ald. Judd and Burdick voted them down. The proposal receives further consideration by the council as a whole.

SWEDISH SHIP TO HAVE NEW TYPE OF ENGINE

LABOR SCOTS DECLINE ALL ROYAL INVITATIONS

Only a Few Members Refuse to Sign Declaration Against Such Functions.

Associated Press Despatch. London, March 15.—Declaring that he cared little whether his record for attendance at the House of Lords was good or bad, although the attendance of the peers there was pretty closely scrutinized nowadays, the Marquis of Bristol, chairman of the West of Scotland County Council, yesterday consented today to continue as chairman of that body for another term.

The Marquis said he was always happy when given work to do, but he never cared to "sit listening to others shouting." He was very proud, he said, to do something for the country in which he lived, and he very gladly accepted the invitation to remain as chairman of the county council.

Only about a half dozen of the Scottish Laborites withheld their signatures, the Times says. The English members of the party were not asked to sign, but it is understood that they are about equally divided on the question. The Times adds that when the subject was first discussed by the party a short time ago, it was decided by a vote of 38 to 37, that while the liberty of individual members should not be restricted, the party itself would not accept such invitations.

The press today reiterates the recent statement that J. Ramsay MacDonald, John Robert Clynes, Philip Snowden and James Henry Thomas are to dine with the King and Queen in Buckingham Palace tonight.

PREPARING FOR RAIDS BY AMERICAN BANDITS

Manitoba Aims to Give the Prospective Invading Robbers Lively Reception.

Canadian Press Despatch. Winnipeg, March 15.—Information has reached the provincial government indicating that bandits from south of the line will this year attempt to repeat the exploits which caused a reign of terror in Southern Manitoba last fall, but everything possible has been done by the provincial police department to prevent raids on banks and capture the raiders.

A statement to this effect was made by Attorney-General R. W. Craig in the legislature last night, when showing the necessity for the increased expenditure in connection with the department, indicated by estimates of \$205,000.

TODAY IN PARLIAMENT.

WILL UNVEIL TABLET TO NORMAL WAR HEROES

London Normal School To Honor ex-Students Who Answered Empire Call.

A strikingly beautiful memorial, in the form of a bronze tablet, will be unveiled in the London Normal School rotunda on 3 p.m., March 23, to perpetuate the names of ex-students who volunteered for service during the late war. Lieut.-Col. S. D. Pepper, D.S.M., assistant state attorney of Michigan, a honor graduate of the first class of the Normal School, who received his diploma in 1900, will perform the unveiling. Col. Pepper served overseas with the American expeditionary force in the capacity of judge advocate-general, receiving the distinguished service medal from Congress for his services. The memorial will be suitably placed on the wall of the Normal School lobby, where the stairs to the second floor divide. The unveiling ceremony will be attended by the faculty and students, and those ex-students who are in London and able to be present. Dr. Dearness, retired principal of the school, will assist Col. Pepper in the unveiling. The department of militia and defense will be represented, it is understood, by Brig.-Gen. King and his staff. 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WILL ASK AMENDMENT TO IRISH ORDER BILL

Steps Being Taken Following Uneasiness of Last Sunday's Arrests.

Associated Press Despatch. London, March 15.—The uneasiness that has followed last Sunday's Irish arrests in Great Britain has induced Sir Kingsley Wood, member of the House of Commons for Woolwich West, to draft a bill, which he will introduce next Tuesday, amending the restoration of order in Ireland act.

The measure proposes that in the event of future deportations under the act the home secretary be obliged to inform the advisory committee established by the act, and that within a week this committee must consider whether the deportation is just and reasonable. The person affected would have the right to attend the hearing.

Members of parliament do not believe that the bill will have the least chance of passing the house, but its introduction will give the government an opportunity to make clear its position, which now is rather obscure. The arrests of last week-end have given rise to the fear in some quarters that persons may be summarily deported without a chance of appeal.

POPULATION OF FRANCE IS INCREASED BY POLES

Associated Press Despatch. Paris, March 15.—Although the birth rate is not doing much to increase the population of France, the number of citizens is being augmented in other ways. Five thousand Poles have taken out their first citizenship papers in the last two years. They came to France, along with forty odd thousand other Poles on contracts to work in the mines and on the farms, and thus partly supply the deficiency in French labor, due to the war.

These workers are brought in by consent of the French government, generally under six months' contract, but most of them stay beyond their time, and many of them marry and become citizens.
