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NEW ALBERTA PREMIER ASKS PEOPLE'S AID FOR ECONOMY

Cabinet Will Not Be Changed,
at Present, Brownlee Says
in Statement.

RELUCTANT TO ACT

Sees No Reason Why He Should
Not Continue To Fill Post
of Attorney-General.

Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 24.—Premier Brownlee, in a brief statement issued to the press today, indicates his intention of pursuing the policy of economy in expenditure and reduction in the cost of government, which has been engaging the attention of the farmer government since it first took office in 1921. In his statement, he expresses regret at accepting the position of president of the executive council.

"The personal relationship developed during four years' association with Mr. Greenfield and my regard for his fine personal qualities and his devotion to the duties of his office, have made it very hard for me to contemplate his retirement from the position he has held since 1921," he says.

The statement continues:
"At a later and appropriate time I will outline the general policies I believe to be necessary for the healthy development of our provincial life."

"For the present, no change will be made in the personnel of the cabinet. The department of municipal affairs will be temporarily assumed by Mr. Reid, who formerly was minister of that department, while the department of provincial secretary will be assumed by Mr. Hoadley."

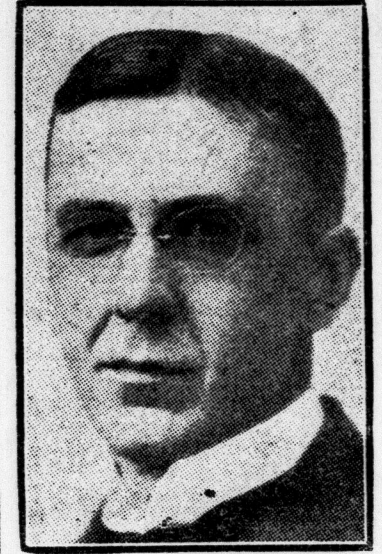
"Believing that in a province so essentially dependent on agriculture, the interests of city, town and country in all fundamental problems are identical, I request the co-operation of all citizens, rural and urban, in an effort to promote unity and harmony of purpose in our provincial thought."

When asked if it was his intention to carry on permanently the duties of both attorney-general and premier of the province, Mr. Brownlee said:
"It is not setting any precedent in Canada for the premier of a province to be also its attorney-general."

It is believed that the government will go to the country early next year—in February or March.

The history of Mr. Greenfield's resignation and Mr. Brownlee's elevation to the premiership is a story of a fight between the private members on the government side of the house and the cabinet, with the final victory resting with the rank and file of the U. F. A.

APPEAL THIS WEEK FOR NORTH HURON

Osgoode Hall To Hear Elec-
tion Case—Plan Is
Outlined.

Toronto, Nov. 24.—The North Huron federal election case, in which Judge Lewis has decided that George Spotton, Conservative, leads James W. King, Progressive, by eight votes, will reach Osgoode hall this week.

While the time limit is drawing to a close, King's lawyers have until Friday of this week to act.

It is urged by the Conservatives that there is no appeal from County Judge Lewis, and his honor ruled that the ballot from which the counterfoils have not been detached shall not be re-counted.

Mr. King's counsel, however, mapped out a plan that will be carried out during the next four days. An appointment will be obtained from a supreme court judge at Osgoode, and a mandamus sought, directing the county judge to count the challenged ballots.

If the supreme judge declines to grant the order, the end should be reached. If, on the other hand, the county judge ignores the decree, contempt of court proceedings could be taken.

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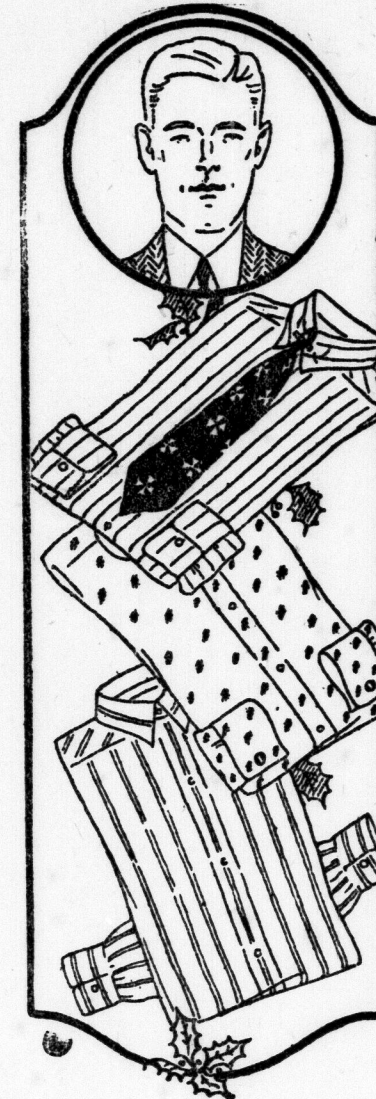
