Town Council

Sprinkling Complaint.

Mr. Wm. Cram entered a complaint against the manner in which the streets are sprinkled or rather against those which are not sprinkled, Weber and Frederick streets were mentioned in particular. The dust on these streets, the communication stated, was unbearable. The complaint asked that the service be improved.

The complaint was referred to the Sprinkling Committee. Ald. Schnarr of that committee stated that the chairman and members were making every effort to remedy any defects in the street sprinkling service.

Wants Connection. Mr. John Grasser of 83 Water St. north asked that he be given sewer connection the only way he could drain his cellar. He agreed to put in a trap to prevent the sewage from backing into the cellar and hold the city harmless from damages that might occur. Referred to Sewer Committee.

Want Union Labor. Secretary Albert J. Weber of the Bricklayers, Masons and Plasterers' Union of Berlin wrote asking the Council to favor the employment of union labor, particularly on the proposed new factory of the Canadian Consolidated Rubber Co. The communication pointed out that the union's membership was composed of nearly 100 two thirds of whom are Property-owners. The union intimated that the members would support the by-law if the Council would guarantee to help in having only union labor recognized, on the erection of this factory.

The communication was referred to the officials of the company. Readjust Taxes. Abraham Ruddle executor of the Hannah Ruddle estate, asked for a readjustment of taxes on property at 79 Scott street. Referred to the Tax Collector.

Want Sprinkling. The residents of Bingham Street petitioned for street sprinkling on that street from Lancaster to Samuel streets. On motion by Aids. Clement and Rohleder, the request was granted.

Asked for Refund. John Hintz asked for a refund on the taxes on the Louisa street side walk. Referred to Court of Revision.

Second Request. The committee of the Cartier Centenary of Montreal again asked the Council for a grant in the amount of \$1000 to commemorate the birth of Sir George Etienne Cartier. No action taken on the request. To Curb Flood. Acting on a communication from

the city engineer of Brantford, the Mayor will attend a meeting to be held in Galt on July 9th which representatives of the municipalities affected by the annual floods of the Grand river, will discuss the advisability of applying to the Government for aid in an effort to bring about co-operation in providing and repairing damages occasioned by the floods.

Another Building Line. A by-law had been prepared to fix the building line of the north side of Pequetan avenue at thirty feet and after some discussion it was passed. Mr. Urop, a resident of that street protested against having the line fixed at 30 feet. This would put a house he contemplated building up against a barn.

Chairman Dietrich of the Board of Works stated that the other houses were back that distance and that it would be too bad to spoil the appearance of the street by allowing a house to be built out from the line.

Ald. Schilling wanted the by-law laid over for two weeks. He argued that the Board of Works had not made any report to the Council on the building line of the street, so that the Council, was at a loss to know the exact conditions.

Get All Line Fixed. After the by-law had been passed, Ald. Clement suggested that the Council at some future date take up the work of fixing the building line on all streets. Much time, he said, was being wasted on the building line by-laws, at every meeting. Alderman Hagen and Detweller were of the same opinion.

The Sanatorium By-law. Rev. Mr. Oberlander addressed the Council in the interests of the proposed by-law to grant aid to the Sanatorium Association for the erection of a sanatorium. He stated that the members of the Council were to take up the matter of placing the by-law before the ratepayers at this meeting. He did not ask that the by-law be submitted alone as he had confidence in the intelligence of the ratepayers when voting upon it, with other by-laws.

Ald. Clement said that it was understood that the questions of submitting the sanatorium by-law would come up at a meeting following the submission of the Canadian Consolidated Rubber Co's by-law.

An adjournment was made at ten o'clock.

Liverpool and Chicago Wheat Futures Close Lower—Live Stock—Latest Quotations.

CHICAGO, July 2.—Sentiment turned overwhelmingly bearish to-day regarding wheat. The basis was the general market covering the spring crop country last night and this morning. Closing prices were easy, 1/4c to 3/4c lower. The decline extended to each of the principal grades. Saturday, wheat, oats off 1/4c to 1/2c and provisions down 2/4c to 3/4c.

The Liverpool market closed to-day on wheat, unchanged to 1/4c lower than yesterday, and on corn 1/4c to 3/4c lower. Wheat and Antwerp and Buenos Aires unchanged.
