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ROYAL WEDDING.

A Daughter of the Duke of Edinburgh
Married to Ferdinand of
Roumania.

Religious and Civil Ceremonies—The
Bride's Dress—Some of the
Presents.

BERLIN, Jan. 10.—The marriage of Crown
Prince Ferdinand, of Roumania, and the
Princess Marie, second child and eldest
daughter of the Duke of Edinburgh, was
celebrated to-day with considerable pomp
and ceremony at the castle of Sigmaringen.
Owing to the fact that to-day is the first
anniversary of the death of the Duke of
Clarence, the Queen and the Prince of
Wales were not present, but were repre-
sented by Sir Edward Malet, British am-
bassador at Berlin. Over one thousand
guests had been invited, and it had been
found necessary to erect a temporary
wing to the castle. Prior to the religious
ceremony the bride and groom, with the
Romanian minister plenipotentiary at
Berlin, Prince Gregory Cluj, and the
Romanian ambassador at Berlin, Prince
Gyula, the Duke of Genoa, representing
King Humbert, the Archduke Leopold, rep-
resenting the Emperor Francis Joseph, the
Crown Prince and Princess of Greece, the
Grand Duke Vladimir and Alexis, rep-
resenting the Czar, and the bride's parents,
the Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh, with
her brother Alfred, and her sisters, Victoria,
Alexandra and Beatrice. The seventeen-
year-old bride was costumed in the richest
white polka silk, embroidered in pearls,
crystal and silver designs, open at the
neck, forming a festoon around the neck,
and dividing into three separate
pieces below the bust. Diamonds, pearls
and opals were the ornaments worn.
At the conclusion of the religious cere-
monies a wedding breakfast was served in
the banquet hall of the palace, after
which the bride exchanged her wedding
clothes for gown of lavender grey cloth,
and the couple took their departure for
one of the castles of Prince Leopold of Hohenzol-
lern-Sigmaringen, father of the bridegroom.
The wedding presents included a silver ser-
vice from the women of Great Britain, and
a writing set in silver from the officers of
the naval garrison at Plymouth. The
Queen's gift was a bracelet of pearls,
and the Duke of Edinburgh presented her
with a diamond ring. The bride's accep-
tance of the Order of the Bath, and
his acceptance will entail upon him the ex-
penditure of nearly \$2,500 as investiture
fees. The honeymoon will last two weeks
and the royal couple will then go to Rou-
mania.

CABLE NEWS.

PARIS, Jan. 9.—Re. Hon. Mr. Gladstone
left Victoria for London to-day. A crowd
of visitors and residents accompanied him
to the station and cheered him as the train

LONDON, Jan. 9.—Miss Frances Willard
was received publicly at Exeter Hall at this
evening's reception. The building was
crowded, and Miss Willard's address was
cheered and applauded enthusiastically.
Lady Henry Somerset presided.

LONDON, Jan. 9.—Eighty-four delegates
representing the 270,000 miners who are
members of the Miners' Federation, met in
session at Birmingham to-day. They are
discussing the question of eight hours, and
employers' liability for accidents.

BERLIN, Jan. 9.—A dynamite bomb was
exploded in Gelsenkirchen this afternoon.
Two small hotels which stand on each side
of the alley-way in which the bomb was
placed were shattered so that the windows
were blown in, the plaster fell from the walls.
Although several persons were injured, no
one was killed. The street hardly twenty yards away, no
body was injured. The man who placed the
bomb was not caught. He is supposed to
be an anarchist and has been in the
district who has gone to the mining region
round Gelsenkirchen for the purpose of
fomenting a strike there in sympathy with
the movement on the Saar.

ROME, Jan. 9.—A sensation has been
caused here by the letter of Pope Leo to the
people of Bologna, in which the Pontiff
states that in nominating Cardinal Serafini
as Metelli to be Archbishop of Bologna, he
had obeyed the divine inspiration. This
unusual declaration on the part of the Pope
regarding the inspiration of his selection of
Cardinal Metelli as his successor in the
Pontificate. The Pope is also reported to
have remarked: "Metelli goes to Bologna
a Cardinal and will return a Pope."

BRUSSELS, Jan. 9.—The accompanying cash-
ier of the Brussels Branch of the New York
Life Insurance Co. was arrested to-day,
accused of misappropriating money belong-
ing to the concern. The cashier confessed.

BERLIN, Jan. 9.—Numerous miners' meet-
ings were held this afternoon in the West-

resolutions favoring a general strike were
passed. In most cases, however, the resolu-
tions were without effect, and the men
continue to work.

LONDON, Jan. 9.—The St. Petersburg

HERETIC BRIGGS.

He is Acquainted of the Offences Charged—The
Case to be Appealed to the Assembly.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—The final meeting
of the Presbytery of New York, sitting as a
court on the trial of the charges
against Rev. Dr. Charles A. Briggs,
was held this afternoon to receive the
report of the special committee having
in charge the consideration of the vote taken
at the last meeting of the judiciary. The
report of the committee says, among other
things, that "without expressing approval of
the critical or theological views embodied
in the inaugural address of Prof. Briggs for
the manner in which they have been ex-
pressed, and that the Presbytery recom-
mends the Rev. Charles A. Briggs, D.D.,
fully acquitted of the offenses alleged
against him, the several charges and spe-
cifications are accepted for probation not hav-
ing been sustained." Col. McCook, for the
prosecution, said he should appeal the case
to the General Assembly.

THE PANAMA SCANDAL.

Charles de Lesseps' Statement—He is Believed
to Have Told All He Knew.

PARIS, Jan. 9.—There is now no doubt
that Charles de Lesseps told the Govern-
ment everything he knew. It is said that
when he completed his statement he expressed
himself greatly relieved. He said he felt
that for years he was bearing a burden of
suspicion which ought to be taken off.
The statement was made in the presence of
his father and himself had been to bring the
Panama Canal enterprise to a suc-
cessful termination, but blackmailers had
taken him by the throat, and the com-
pany had been compelled to buy support
and aid, which, in the interest of the com-
pany and for the benefit of the thousands
of French investors, ought to have been
given freely and as a matter of public
duty. He hoped the people of France
would place the responsibility where it
belonged. Fontaine followed De Lesseps
example and made a full confession.
