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TO ABOLISH SIZE LIMIT OF LOBSTERS

St. John and Charlotte Counties to be Only Exceptions.

NEW TRAP RULES

OTTAWA, April 24.—The recommendation of Commander Waleham for the shortening of the lobster fishing season has been rejected by the fisheries committee of the commons on the ground that it would too seriously disturb the industry.

A very radical recommendation is made that all along the coast except in the counties of St. John and Charlotte, New Brunswick, the size limit be abolished. In St. John and Charlotte the limit will be ten and a half inches.

It was recommended that in 1911 new trap regulations be enforced which would prevent too many small lobsters being taken. It was recommended that the date of traps be not less than an inch and a quarter apart and the mesh of the net at either end be not less than three and a half inches.

Railway subsidies for this session include no new votes. The former vote are renewed, amounting to a total of 2,582 miles, which if built will involve government aid to the extent of \$19,944,990.

In New Brunswick the subsidies are: To the International Railway Company of New Brunswick, for three and a half miles of its railway.

For a line from Grand Falls to St. John, not exceeding 225 miles.

For a line from Conners, at the terminal of the Temiscouata to a point on the boundary line between New Brunswick and Quebec, at the foot of Beau Lake, not exceeding eighteen miles.

To the York and Caplan Railway Company for a line from its present terminus to a point on the National Transcontinental Railway, not exceeding nine miles.

For a line from Plaster Rock to Riley Brook, not exceeding twenty-eight miles.

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BOARD OF TRADE EMBARKS ON A PROGRESSIVE CAMPAIGN

The first matter discussed was the all important one of railway facilities, and also the matter of the need of changes at the Mount crossing. After discussing these matters a committee composed of Mayor Murray, John McLean, A. McLennan, Dr. Pinaud and A. E. G. McKinnis was given charge of these matters.

The Secretary read the draft of by-laws as drafted by the by-laws committee. These were adopted as read.

The Secretary Treasurer read his report as follows:

IMMIGRANT RUSH TO CANADA

Last of Steamers to Arrive at Halifax on Tuesday

On the arrival of the steamer 'Southwest' at Halifax tomorrow the immigration rush to Canada by this port will be stopped, and after that all passengers coming from the Old Country and other foreign points will be landed at Quebec, Rimouski and Montreal. The steamer 'Victorian' docked at Halifax on Friday morning last with 150 passengers. Eight hundred and sixty nine of her passengers were landed and passed through Montreal by special train on Wednesday morning last and four hundred and sixty nine of her passengers were landed and passed through Montreal by special train on Thursday morning last.

Among the passengers on the 'Victorian' there came a large number of wealthy Englishmen. The steamer 'Mongolian' docked on Saturday. On account of the rough weather the steamer was unable to dock in the morning and it was not until the evening it could be taken to the wharf. The steamer 'Palatin' and 'Lloyd' line, are expected to arrive at Halifax today and will land upwards of 1500 passengers, who will go to points in the Canadian West.

EASTERN S. S. SUMMER PLANS ARE COMPLETE

The Eastern Steamship Company have completed arrangements for the summer season of 1910 and they announce their list of sailings. It provides in addition to coastwise trips, for three direct trips each week from Boston and St. John. A new feature of this will be a Sunday trip from Boston to St. John direct.

The steamer which will perform the service are the turbine steel steamship Governor Cobb, and the steamship Captain Austin and Governor Dingley. These vessels are equipped with wireless telegraphy, main deck observation dining rooms, comfortable staterooms and every convenience for an enjoyable sea voyage.

The summer arrangement will go into effect in June, the first sailing from Boston being on June 21 and continuing until Oct. 1. The order of sailing will be as follows:—

NEW BRUNSWICK IS GOOD ENOUGH

John B. Peel Returns From States to Buy Farm in This Province.

NATIVE OF ST. JOHN

John B. Peel, a former resident of St. John, called at The Graphic office last night to insert an advertisement for a farm. He is anxious to purchase one along the St. John River. He believes that this is the greatest farming province in America, said Mr. Peel, and a far better place in which to locate than any part of the United States. I fail to see why young men leave the province of New Brunswick for the Western prairies. I am equally astonished at the crowds in years past of New Brunswick people to the New England States. I have lived in New York for many years, and you can say that New Brunswick is good enough for me.

Mr. Peel is an interesting man. He belongs to one of the oldest families in St. John, and up in the old graveyard there is a tombstone bearing the date 1818, and the name of Mrs. Humphrey Peel—Mr. Peel's grandmother. Several years ago Mr. Peel had charge of the machinery at the manganese mines in Kings and Albert counties, then controlled by Col. A. J. Markham, afterwards manager of the St. John Sun. Mr. Peel recalls many interesting incidents in connection with his association with Col. Markham. While in New York Mr. Peel had the honor of being invited to give a banquet and install floor material.

After some discussion it was the unanimous opinion that such a committee would be beneficial and the following were appointed: John T. Reed, H. B. Anslow and A. A. Andrew.

Mr. W. A. Mott, K. C. introduced a matter in regard to the establishment in Lunenburg of a Canadian Mortgage Bank, and a resolution favoring such an institution was passed. The meeting then adjourned.
