**CANADIAN OFFICERS VISIT INDUSTRIES**  
Will Make Tour of England for Improving Business Relations.  
(Canadian Associate Press Cable)  
London, March 4.—The Federation of British Industries consisting of 20,000 firms, has invited Major S. T. Layton, Capt. E. V. McKernan, Major G. H. Stever, Capt. F. H. Dunham, Capt. A. S. Brown, Major W. M. McGhie, Lieut. W. B. Scott, W. Hogg, Capt. W. Stevens, Capt. N. Frank, Col. W. B. Wosnon and Col. D. S. Ellis as representatives of the Canadian Expeditionary Force to tour the chief manufacturing centres of Great Britain before returning to the Dominion. The idea being that they shall meet foreign manufacturers and gain knowledge for improving business relations between Great Britain and Canada.

It was announced on behalf of the Federation that ambassadors to foreign countries to represent British industries would be appointed. Lieut. W. B. Scott mentioned above is a native of Restigouche County, He is the youngest son of Thos. G. Scott of Dalhousie.

During their tour while visiting the largest Motor and Electric Light factories and aeroplane works in the country they dined at the Princess Restaurant, where they met Sir George Percy and others.

While in London on March 2nd Lieut. W. B. Scott met Bernard J. Delaney, son of John B. Delaney of the Dalhousie Custom House.

Lieut. W. B. Scott is having the experience of a life time. He is such a young man. He has done grand work in the war. A hearty welcome awaits him in his big town on his return.
