MYSTERIOUS DISEASE HITS ITALIAN CATTLE

ROME, Sept. 29.-Cattle in Marema district on the edge of Tuscany are dying of a mysterious disease which baffles veterinarians. Authorities, in a desperate effort to check the ravages of the plague, have declared a ban on the import and export of cattle in the affected areas.

The disease is thought to be due to poisonous tick, which imbeds itsel under the skin of the cattle while they are grazing. The first symptoms of the disease are not seen, and the first sign that there is anything wrong is the sudden death of the animals. Large sums of money are being spent

Detective Lajole, who took a prominent part in the case, starts to-morrow to serve 152 witnesses with subpoenas to appear at the trial, which starts in

a week's time.
