Dear Sir:—As I am looking for some men for service at the Internment Station, Amherst, N. S. as guards over the German prisoners, I thought that possibly you might help me by your paper.

About 20 strong and intelligent men are needed at Amherst on account of the increase of prisoners about to be made. Age limit 18—40.

Single men \$1.10 per day and subsistence.

Married men \$1.55 per day and subsistence.

They should be examined by the local doctor and receive a certificate stating fitness for Home Duty. This should be forwarded to me and I will provide ticket to Amherst. If married they should bring marriage certificate with them.

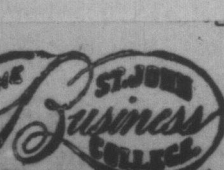
