Since the establishment of the Bishopric of Montreal there has been a great addition to the Church of England in this portion of the diocese capecially. Many of the old parishes and missions have been subdivided into more manageable districts, enabling the clergyman in charge of them to concentrate their efforts, and give their services with regularity and frequency. Additional elergymon have been permanently stationed at Henryville, Stanbridge East, Cowansville, Sutton, Freste Village and Granby, all in this section of the country; and many new churches have been built, or are in course of erection. It is, however, matter for painful reflection to know how much more is being done for the support of religion in many of the less wealthy and newly constituted missions, where reduced grants have been made by "the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel" in aid of the stipends of the clergy, than in some of the old rectories, which have for so many years been receiving such liberal help for the payment of their ministers. At Clarencoville, on a vacancy occurring, the allowances now paid to the present rector will cease, and instead of looking forward to this contingency and preparing for it, except the church and grave-yard, there is no property belonging to the rectory whatever, no residence even or glebo; and the parish will, unless some great exertion is made, instead of occupying an important position in the diocese, sink down to an inferior grade, being served occasionally by a clergyman resident clsewhere. Philipsburgh is very little better off; there is here, it is true, a rectory house, but in a most dilapidated condition, and a small unprofitable glebe located at a distance. At Frelighsburg things are rather more in advance, and the members of the church appear inclined to bestir themselves—to do what is needful towards putting all in order; but a little more effort now would be advisable. Nor can the large and wealthy congregation that assemble in the church at Durham feel satisfied that they are in any fitting measure discharging the debt which they owe to God and kind christian friends for liberal help so long enjoyed. Archdeacon Lower joined the Bishop at Stanbridge East, and preached there and at Dunham, from whence he proceeded to Lennoxville, where he was to act as one of the examiners of the candidates for the degree of M.A. While they were at Stanbridge there was a meeting held in aid of the Church Society, and a Parochial Association was formed. The labours of the Rev. I. Constantine are beginning to produce some decided and manifest effects for good here. At the Bishop's previous visit there was not one caudidate for confirmation, and scarcely a communicant, except amongst the clergyman's family; now fourtoen were confirmed, several are regular communicants, and the congregation are full and regular in attendance. The parsonago house, an exceedingly commodious, substantial and appropriate one, is just completed. At Churchville the service was held in the new building, which however is yet incom-plete; but it is expected to be ready for consecration in October. At Sutton all is going on exceedingly well. The congregations are always full ones here, and the members, if not very wealthy, seem to be working together heartily. The church is now completed, having lately received the addition of a tall and not inelegant spire; a good bell however is still wanting. The school is built and in use under a very
