

Messrs. James Campbell & Son have just added to their series of "The National Readers" a sixth book, or "Advanced Reader," and which may now be had of the trade. They are about to issue a Canadian copyright edition, by arrangement of the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher's "Life of Jesus, the Christ."

Messrs. Hunter, Rose & Co. have nearly ready a native authorized edition of a new work by George Macdonald, the author of "Alec Forbes," entitled, "Wilfred Cumbermede: an Autobiography."

Messrs. Irving and Flint are about to issue, in a separate form, the new story of social and domestic life "Hannah," by the author of "John Halifax, Gentleman."

Messrs. Copp, Clark & Co. have just published a new authorized text book for schools—a "Handbook of Christian Morals," by the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Chief Superintendent of Education.

Mr. Russell Wilkinson, (late of the Canadian News Company) has just issued a complete edition in 8vo. of Jean Ingelow's Poems. It is issued in paper at 75c., and in cloth gilt at \$1 25.

Messrs. Adam, Stevenson & Co. will issue immediately No. 2 of "The Pulpit Harvest," embracing "Three Discourses on the 1st chapters of Genesis, and the Mosaic Account of Creation," by the Rev. Dr. Stuart Robinson, of Louisville, Kentucky. They will also shortly issue, "The Christian's Manual; a Book of Directions and Devotions to be used Daily, and especially in Preparing for Holy Communion," and Professor Murray's (of Kingston) Prize Essay on "The Influence of the Scottish Ballads and Songs on the Character of the Scottish People." The same house will publish, at an early date, conjointly with Messrs. Longman & Co., of London, "A Colonist's View of Colonial Questions," by Mr. J. Matthews, of Toronto; and, by arrangement with the English translator, Mr. W. F. Rae, author of "Westward by Rail," an edition of M. Taine's "Notes on England." These sprightly and interesting "Notes" were contributed by M. Taine to the Paris *Temps*, and English readers will have met many of them in the newspaper press, where they have been copied from the London *Daily News*, for which paper they were translated by Mr. Rae.

Adam, Stevenson & Co. in their retail business, have just issued a new general Book Catalogue, embracing selections from current and standard publications in the various departments of literature. ENGLISH.

Messrs. A. & C. Black have now completed their elegant centenary edition, in 25 volumes, crown 8vo, of the Waverley Novels. Their new "One Hundred Volume edition" of Scott's entire works, with illustrations, is also completed.

Messrs. Cassell, Petter and Galpin issue volume 2 of "Little Folks," a charming illustrated annual for the young; Volume 1 of their "Illustrated History of the Franco-German War;" and they announce, to be published at intervals, a cheap edition, with all the original illustrations, and a revised text, of Figuier's Works on Popular Science.

Messrs. T. & T. Clark issue two new volumes in their important series of the Foreign Theological Library:

viz. Delitzsch's Commentary on the Psalms, vol 3, and Hengstenberg on the Old Covenant.

Messrs. Rivington & Co. have now completed, and issue at a cheaper rate, the Bishop of Lincoln's (Dr. Wordsworth) Commentary on the Bible, in 6 vols., 8vo. Of their late publications are Dr. Dollinger's Fables respecting the Popes of the Middle-Ages; Shipley's Glossary of Ecclesiastical Terms; and

Mr. Tyerman's "Life and Times of John Wesley;" "Woman's Worth and Worthlessness," by Gail Hamilton; and in the department of Fiction, "Fair to See," by L. W. M. Lockhart; "Blade-o'-Grass," by B. L. Farjeon; and "The American Baron," by Prof. James De Mille.

Messrs. Charles Scribner & Co. issue a new volume of Lange's Commentaries, on "Joshua, Judges, and Ruth;" Max Muller's "Lectures on the Science of Religion;" Dr. Hodge's "System of Theology," Vol. 2, "On Anthropology and Soteriology;" and a popular edition of the second series of Froude's "Short Stories on Great Subjects."
