If the house moves as quickly tomorrow as it did today then we would consider as No. 5 Bill C-83, an act respecting industrial change and manpower adjustment. No. 6 would be Bill C-70, to provide for the safety of persons employed in federal works. If those are all completed I would then call items standing in the name of the Minister of Justice which have been called before. That, I think, would consume the time of the house for Tuesday and Wednesday.
