EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

LAOS—REQUEST FOR STATEMENT ON PRESENT POSITION

On the orders of the day:

Mr. R. N. Thompson (Red Deer): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Secretary of State for External Affairs. In view of the urgent and deteriorating situation in Laos and the presence in that country of Canada's member of the truce supervisory commission, does the minister have some word for the house?

Hon. Paul Martin (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, the situation in Laos, as I mentioned yesterday and as we now know from the statement made by Mr. Stevenson at the United Nations this morning, has deteriorated, and this does affect the work of the commission. I expressed regret the other day that the Polish member of the commission had temporarily withdrawn from service on that commission. I said that the Polish government had been requested by Canada to have its member of the commission resume his duties.

The situation is one that is changing rapidly and we will have to await events. I may be in a position to make a statement on this tomorrow when the department's estimates are before the house.

Mr. H. W. Herridge (Kootenay West): A supplementary question to the Secretary of State for External Affairs, Mr. Speaker. Does the government of Canada support the policy of the government of the United States with respect to Viet Nam?

Mr. Martin (Essex East): Mr. Speaker, I have already dealt with this question, but I hope to deal with it at greater length tomorrow.

RUSSIA—SUGGESTED EXCHANGE OF PETROLEUM PRODUCTS FOR WHEAT

Woolliams (Bow River): Mr. Speaker, I had hoped to put this question to the Minister of Trade and Commerce and the Minister of Agriculture, but in their absence maybe I can direct it to the Prime Minister. I may say it deals with a very important matter concerning western Canada. Reference has been made in an article in the New York Times, reprinted in the Calgary Herald, to negotiations between the government of Canada and the Soviet union to accept petroleum and other oil products in return for Canadian wheat. Is there any justification for this report in the New York Times?
