Dear Principal Morgan,

At a meeting of the Council of the Royal Society on Saturday I took the liberty of proposing your name as a Fellow of the Society. The Society, as you probably know, is made up of five Sections. Under our By-laws we may also elect a very limited number of Fellows who are not attached to any particular Section. That is done by a recommendation of the Council to the annual meeting. As a member of this group you would vote at general meetings, but not as a member of any particular Section. Otherwise your position would be the same as a member of a Section.
