Snowy Baker, successor to Hugh McIntosh, the Australian fight impresario, has called asking Bronson to go to that country for a series of winter title bouts. Bronson made a trip around the world in 1910, and has proved to be a great drawing card in foreign lands. Lang will get a great try-out with Bronson.

## Frank Chance Signs With N. Americans

Salary Is Said to Be the Largest Ever Paid to a Ball Player.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—The American League brought out its heaviest batteries today and captured Frank Chance. The former Chicago National League team's manager was signed to manage the New York American League Club at a salary and lot rest which amounts to \$120,000 for the three years for which he signed—the largest amount ever paid to a baseball player.

Of this sum \$75,000 is salary, and the remainder the estimated value of 5 per cent. of the net earnings of the club, since he arrived in Chicago, and said he had been offered terms which no one in his right mind would expect to sign.

He said tonight, "When I arrived yesterday I had fully made up my mind that I would accept the offer. I had been offered terms which no one in his right mind would expect to sign."

The terms, learned from an authorized source, are not officially announced, but include for Chance a contract to manage the club for three years at \$25,000 a year and 5 per cent. of the net earnings for the three seasons. The latter is believed to amount to \$15,000 annually, perhaps more.

Chance will assume active management of the team on Feb. 15, when he will reach New York to attend the American League meeting. He will average the details for the training trip. The New York Club will have its spring workout in Bermuda, where the diamond practice.

Plans for "Chance Day" in Chicago are under way. The New York team will make its first visit to Comiskey Park in May.
