LABOR OFFICERS

NOW INDICTED

Nineteen to Stand Trial on Charge of Entering Unlawful Conspiracy.

CHARLESTOWN, W. Va., June 7.—President John P. White and eighteen other officials of the United Mine Workers of America were indicted in the federal court here today on a charge of violating the Sherman anti-trust law. It is alleged the defendants conspired with the coal operators of western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois to raise wages in the West Virginia coal fields so as to prevent its competition with the other four states in the western market.

The indictments charged that the nineteen men, affiliated with the United Mine Workers of America did in Kanawha County, West Virginia, and within the jurisdiction of the federal district court, engage in a combination and conspiracy in restraint of trade and commerce in the several states.
