

REPORTS ON CROPS ARE LESS GLOOMY

Improved Conditions in Argentina and Australia Reflected at Chicago.

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—Bears had the advantage today in wheat on account of reports reassuring crop conditions in Argentina and Australia. Despite the fact that covering by shorts railed the market, there was a weak tone at the close, with prices 1/4 to 1/2c under last night. Corn finished unchanged to 1/4c higher; oats off a shade to 1/4c, and provisions ranging from 1/4c decline to a rise of 1/4c. Cable reports from Buenos Aires declared that the crop outlook on wheat was from 10 to 15 per cent better than the previous year. It was flatly asserted that the droughts here did not warrant any unqualified forecast of damage or because of alleged backwardness of growth. On the contrary, the crop was said to be distinctly favorable. Selling pressure that resulted here received additional emphasis from similar estimates of the probable yield in Australia. Buying at the decline reached a liberal volume and was supposed to be chiefly for a prominent speculator, who, it has been active in selling the market short. Recovery in prices was helped by spot purchases here and at Minneapolis on selling contracts. The opening featured a corn advance on account of reports that the country was shipping next to nothing, despite advanced premiums. It was also asserted that selling next from the east had much improved. The wheat advance, in the market, contrasted decidedly with sentiment during the first half of the day, when prices suffered. One railhead with corn, not the same extent as last night, was the cause of the advance. Most of the day the cereal was under heavy short selling pressure. In the main, provisions held steady. There was a fairly good outside inquiry, based on the outlook for corn and hogs.

There was a good demand for all classes of fat cattle, as there were buyers for all kinds of stock. The stocker market was not as good as has been, and prices were reported to be about 25c lower for 2000 lbs. calves. Sheep, lambs and calves sold at steady prices and were easier at the close of the market.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—(Can. Press.) A Loughrey, proprietor of the Manhattan Pharmacy, was fined \$100 and costs by Police Magistrate J. C. Judd this morning on a charge of a breach of the Liquor License Act. The charge arose out of the sale of four ounces of alcohol. Loughrey had sold a quantity of alcohol, which he claimed was not a liquor, up to one gallon without a physician's prescription and without enquiring for what purpose it was to be used. The magistrate held that a liquid containing ninety-five per cent. proof spirits comes under the definition of spirituous liquor and that it is a drinkable liquor which is intoxicating. He pointed to the fact that sub-section one of section two distinctly states that a liquor is spirituous liquor and two and one-half per cent. proof spirits shall be conclusively deemed to be intoxicating.
