Britain was unprepared for a war of this magnitude. She had an expeditionary force composed of highly trained regulars, but of small strength as compared with the hosts called to the colors by continental countries. 

And now on the brink of my grave I declare to the world that I am proud to have been the husband of the purest, noblest woman that ever lived-Helen Becker. This acknowledgment is the only legacy I can leave her. I bid you all good-bye. Father I am ready to go. Amen."
